COURT PROCEEDINGS.

Judge Powers convened Court Monday and the ten cases assigned for trial were continued or dismissed. John Dethman was surrendered to Sheriff last Saturday by his bondsman and this was the only case tried to the jury. Dethman was indicted last November for larceny of some \$33.90 from John Paulsen who works for Fred Kastner in Otter Creek township. At the close of the State's evidence on motion of defendant's attorney the Court instructed the jury to return a verdict of not guilty; by the way this was the first jury empaneled in the new court house.

The jury was Ernst Plough, F. M. Merritt, T. W. Bell, Christ Schmidt, Gus Nael, B. Wickwirre, E. J. Gunn, Jacob Kefford, J. M. C. North, Fred Gronau, and W. C. Pollock, and these twelve good, true and lawful men had their pictures taken by the Review artist.

In the case of Neddermeyer vs Crawford county, Salinger & Korte appear with Cochran and Egan and will file a motion for a change of venue to some other county.

In Lena Kruthoff vs City of Denison the cause was dismissed by Judge. In Frahm vs Boetger the cause was dismissed by Judge, no one appearing for plaintiff.

In town of Manilla vs Hans Sieck the cause was remanded to the mayor of Manilla for final disposition.

The cause of Larson vs Larson et al is set for trial next Tuesday at 1.30 p. m. Judge Powers will return at that time and hear this case.

The Grand Jury returned an indictment against Joe Andrews for breaking and entering the house of Edward Meyers of Soldier township on Aug 4. last, defendant's bond fixed at \$500.00. This was the only indictment returned by the Grand Jury and they adjourned Wednesday.
