## McMAHON SENATOR.

Harmonious Convention Names P. D. McMahon of Crawford.

### HE ACCEPTS NOMINATION.

Hogue, Dewell and Kuehne Pledge Support to New Candidate—Convention was a Love Feast.

The republicans of the Crawford-Harrison-Monona district held a second convention in Missouri Valley this morning and by acclamation selected Hon. P. D. McMahon of Crawford county as their candidate for Senator. The convention was marked by the utmost harmony, the republicans recognizing the importance of electing a senator from this district.

Senator Hogue, Hon. J. S. Dewell and Hon. Carl F. Kuehne each made brief speeches in which they pledged their earnest support to the new candidate. In the nominations Crawford county passed with the statement that its delegates were ready to support any good candidate either from Harrison or Monona. Neither county presented a candidate and Mr. McMahon was nominated. He made a most favorable impression in his speech of acceptance saying that he took the nomination as a duty impos-

ed upon him by the republicans, that he knew the situation was a difficult one and that he expected the support of every delegate and of every republican. He said that he should do his best to win and if elected to honestly represent the republicans and the whole of the district.

P. D. McMahon is too well known in this county to need introduction. He is a man in his own right, capable, loyal and a splendid citizen in every respect. He is a graduate at law and has had many years experience in the legal profession. For years he was mayor of Charter Oak, even when that town was democratic. He served as postmaster at Charter Oak and for years had sole management of the large affairs of the firm of Shaw and Kuehne in the west part of the county. He is now with the Bank of Denison as manager of the farm loan department. We know that Mr. McMahon will make an ideal senator and that he will be true to the best interests of his party and of his constituents. We shall have more to say concerning his candidacy in succeeding issues. We trust that every republican and every voter in a Crawford county will make a personal effort to secure the election of this splendid young man to represent us in the next two sessions of the legislature.




