HOLY LIFE IS ENDED.

J. W. Wightman Dies at Age of Eighty-Two.

A SPLENDID CHRISTIAN MAN

Death Comes to Him at Fairfield Neb. Funeral in Denison on Tuesday

John William Wightman, well known to every old-time citizen of Denison passed away at the home of his daughter Mrs. W. W. Cook at Fairfield Neb., on the morning of Sunday Oct. 7th. The remains were brought to Denison for interment and the funeral ceremonies were held on Tuesday afternoon at the First Baptist Church, Rev. C. H. Stull officiating.

Mr. Wightman was one of the old residents of Denison. He came here when the town was but a hamlet and he was known to all for his gentle, kindly, Christian life. He was a simple hearted, guileless man. Honest and honorable in every transaction, upright, straight-forward and manly. Without ostentation, without hypocrisy, he led a pure and holy Christian life. He was not of that type which gives constant praise that they are better than other men, he was content to let light of a clean white soul shine upon the world with sweet benignity. There were three things in which he took constant delight, his religion, his family and his republicanism. During his later years he lived with his daughters visiting each in turn, taking an active interest in all that concerned them, playing fondly with his grand children and with his great grand children and enjoying in many ways the fruits of a well-spent life. Mr. Wightman was born in Stanbridge, Canada, July 31st, 1821. He grew to young manhood as a farmer in the British domains, and it was in Canada that he was married in 1843 to his beloved and devoted wife Miss Phoebe Hungerford. When he was 32 years of age he migrated to the United States, first settling in Swanton, Vermont. Here he lived as a farmer until 1864 when he decided to move to the enterprising West. He lived in Illinois for a year, then removed to Quasqueton, Iowa, and in 1869 moved

to Crawford county. He lived on a farm north of Denison until the death of his wife in 1871 after which he moved to Denison which has been his home during the latter part of his life. He was a devout member of the Baptist church and took great pride in his Baptist ancestry, his forefathers having been prominent in the history of that church for several centuries.


Mr. and Mrs. Wightman were the parents of nine children. Of these three are dead, Almira dying in 1848, Laura in 1858 and John B. in 1872. Six daughters survive him and it was the privilege of all of them to be near him during his last days and to be present when the loving father was laid to rest for aye. These daughters are, Mrs. Clara Wilson of Denison, Mrs. Emma Mooney of Minden, Neb., Mrs. Eva McHenry of Wayne, Neb., Mrs. Nellie Cook of Fairfield, Neb., Mrs. Anna Penny of Wood River, Neb., and Mrs. May Hendricks of Sioux City.

We can but feel that these children were greatly blessed in that their father was permitted to remain with them so many years. Fifteen years more than the allotted three score and ten passed over his head, whitening his hair, smoothing worldly cares from his brow and leaving his heart as pure and gentle as a child's. For several weeks before his death Mr. Wightman had been afflicted with creeping paralysis, his sufferings were intense and death came to him as a relief. The funeral services were conducted at the home of Mr. A. D. Wilson with public service at the Baptist church. The services were attended by a large number of our older citizens, the choir sang his favorite hymn "Lead Kindly Light", and Rev. C. H. Stull extolled beautifully and truthfully the beauties of his Christian life and example. The Review extends to all its loved ones its most sincere sympathy but knows that they will find comfort and consolation and a source of constant pride in the noble, tender life he lived and the Christian death he died.

JUDGE CONNER AT DELOIT.




