

PROGRESS OF THE CAMPAIGN

Our Weekly Republican Letter From Des Moines.

Des Moines, Oct. 10.—The chief fight of the Iowa campaign is on the legislature. The democrats are aiming direct at the United States senate for one, and possibly two, democrats in the upper branch of congress from Iowa. It has developed the past week that while the fight for the control of the state is to be kept up, the democrats have come to realize fully the impossibility of reducing the republican majority on the state ticket, and are now concentrating their efforts on the legislature in the hope that they will be able to send to the United States senate one or two democrats. In every legislative district where there is the least hope of success the democrats, assisted and encouraged by the corporation interests that desire Iowa should render a verdict of disapproval of the Theodore Roosevelt program for federal control, are mapping a determined fight for defeat of the republicans.

There is now no doubt that the various committees and press bureaus engaged in this work are supplied with a vast fund of money which is now being freely used to discredit all Iowa republicans and the republican administration of Iowa affairs, legislative and executive, and these allied forces are prepared to make a bitter fight at the close of the campaign to secure control of the Iowa legislature. The attack on the Iowa congressional delegation and the senators is being waged with fierceness, and circulars and letters are being made use of in vast numbers to convey misinformation and the most inexcusable criticism.

Vice-President Fairbanks is to speak in Waterloo next Saturday with Governor Cummins, addressing a Third district rally. Speaker Cannon has already delivered a number of speeches in the state. Senator Beveridge opened the republican campaign in Des Moines. The presence of these men of national reputation in Iowa attests the fact that the republicans of the nation are keeping a watchful eye on Iowa and that when the votes are counted in November and the republican majority is reckoned up there will be millions of republicans who will rejoice should the results show that Iowa has again, as in many other years, upheld the flag of republicanism with a handsome majority for the ticket. The meeting in Des Moines addressed by the Indiana senator was one of the finest meetings ever held in the city, and the largest hall was entirely inadequate for the occasion. The senator eloquently portrayed the things which make the republican party strong with the people today, and complimented the Iowa senators and congressmen for their work at Washington. He complimented Iowa on her able cabinet officers and on "that splendid republican, your candidate for governor, Albert B. Cummins." The senator in discussing the affair from the standpoint of a national republican declared that the changes in the tariff made necessary by changing conditions should be made by the republicans and not by democrats. He called especial attention to the Cuban situation and the necessity for continuing

republican policies until it is settled. This week Governor Van Sant, of Minnesota, comes into Iowa to speak for the success of the republican ticket. He speaks in Mason City Friday evening and in Burt and Estherville on Saturday. In addition to every one of the candidates for congress there will be on the stump Messrs. Byers, Garst, Carroll, Eaton and Palmer of the state ticket. Governor Cummins opened the campaign in Wisconsin with a big meeting at Milwaukee last Saturday evening, and in addition he was given a banquet by the republicans of Wisconsin.

The democrats have printed at great expense a campaign handbook which is being circulated among the politicians. It is devoted almost entirely to personal attacks upon Governor Cummins and to denunciation of the republican management of Iowa affairs. It is filled with gross misrepresentations as to the taxes and expenses of the state of Iowa.

REVIEW'S MARKET LETTER.

The run of cattle the past week has been moderate. Very few corn fed cattle of flesh and quality have been offered, best kinds last week selling as high as \$6.25. Good kinds are quotable at \$5.50 to \$5.75; fair to good \$5.25 to \$5.75. There is starting to come a small offering of short-fed kinds. These do not meet with very good reception packers preferring the good grass beef to cattle of uncertain killing quality. Those kinds are quotable at \$4.50 and on down. The cow market has been strong and active the past week, prices showing an advance of 15 to 20 cents over a week ago. Good kinds of grass cows and heifers are selling at \$3.25 to \$3.65; fair to good \$2.60 to \$3.15; canners and cutters \$1.75 to \$2.40.

The good inquiry that has been noticeable for heavy fleshy feeders throughout the fall was even more noticeable last week. While there has not been any material advance prices have ruled strong. Good to choice cattle are selling at \$4.25 up as high as \$5.20; fair to good kinds \$4.00 to \$4.25; good to choice light and medium weights \$3.85 to \$4.25 fair to good \$3.40 to \$3.65.

The first break for ten days occurred in the hog market today, when prices are a shade lower. The bulk sold at \$6.25 to \$6.35 with top a \$6.42 1-2. The range is narrowing down materially, but it will not be long now before heavy weights will command the premium. Clay, Robinson & Co.

TIPPECANOE PRIZES.

Banner and Flag Again Offered to Republicans Who Make the Best Showing in Election.

The Iowa Veteran Tippecanoe Club again announces its prize banner and flag as open to a contest for their possession.

The Republicans of the several counties of the State are invited to compete for both. The banner has been won in successive years as follows:

Winnebago, 1889; Clay, 1890; Dubuque, 1891-1901; Scott, 1892-4-6-8; Plymouth, 1893; Howard, 1895; Decatur, 1897; Monroe, 1902-3; Monona, 1893-1900-1904.

The flag was won in 1901 by Davis County, in 1902 by Jasper, in 1903 by Harrison, and in 1904 by Polk County.

In 1889 the Club adopted the method of awarding the prize banner to the county whose Republicans would, in the election of that year, make the best showing as compared with the election the preceding year. The offer was continued in that way until 1899, when it was determined to compare the gain each year with the last preceding presidential vote.

The following is the address of the Club, which has been endorsed by the Republican State Central Committee. To the Republican Electors of the State of Iowa:

The Iowa Veteran Tippecanoe Club in accordance with its custom each year since 1889, again offers its prize banner and fine silk flag to the Republican voters of those counties that will show, at the election to be held on the 6th day of November, 1906, the largest gains in majority on the vote for Albert B. Cummins for Governor, as compared with the majorities given in the year 1904 for the candidates at large for electors of President and Vice-President favoring the election of Theodore Roosevelt and Charles W. Fairbanks.

The following are the resolutions making the formal offer:

Resolved, By the executive committee of the Iowa Veteran Tippecanoe Club, that the right to hold the Tippecanoe banner for the ensuing biennial period will be awarded to the Republicans of the county which, at the coming general election, shall make the greatest proportionate gain in majority as compared with the vote of the year 1904.

Resolved Further, That the Tippecanoe flag shall be awarded to the county whose Republicans shall make the best absolute gain in majority as compared with the year 1904. In case the flag, on such showing, would go to the same county as the banner, the county making second best absolute gain shall be entitled to the flag.

It will be understood that the majority mentioned above is over all opposition.
