A MANILLA TRAGEDY.

Mother of Ten is Killed. Father Goes Insane

RESULT OF A RUNAWAY.

Mrs. Jens Lorenzen Thrown from Buggy Dies from Injuries Husband's Insane from Grief

From Manilla comes news of a fatal runaway accident, which resulted in the death of Mrs. Jens Lorenzen and which has driven the husband insane through grief. On Saturday afternoon Mrs. Jens Lorenzen started to drive from Manilla to her home, four and one-half miles southeast of that city. She was accompanied by her oldest child, a girl of fifteen, and her baby two years old. About a mile east of Manilla they passed the home of Wm. Luth. The Luth's were at work in the field by the road, digging potatoes and had left their coats hanging on the fence. Mrs. Lorenzen's team became frightened at the fluttering garments and dashed wildly down the road. The girl jumped and was uninjured, miraculously the baby was also unhurt. The buggy was up set, however, Mrs. Lorenzen was thrown out on her head, her clothing became entangled in the wheels and she was dragged some distance by the frenzied team.

The men in the field quickly ran to Mrs. Lorenzen's assistance, the team was stopped, and she was carried to her home in an unconscious condition. At first it was thought that she might recover, but on Wednesday morning she died.

But this was not to end the tragedy. Mr. Lorenzen was completely overcome by the shock and it is now reported that he has lost his reason. He is being cared for by kindly neighbors and that in all probability it will be necessary to send him to the hospital for the insane.

Mr. and Mrs. Lorenzen were the parents of ten children, the oldest a girl, fifteen years of age. They were prospering finely and would soon have been in a condition of financial independence. Both were highly respected by all who knew them and the entire people of Iowa and Nishnabotny townships are plunged in deepest grief over the tragedy.

FOOTBALL GAME WAS A TIE

Denison and Woodbine Struggle At Foot Ball Without A Score.

Denison made a determined effort to buck the line but the Woodbine Twiners rallied and held. Before another play could be made time was called and the game ended without a score.

The game demonstrated the fitness of both teams and proves the assertion that Denison has fine material for a team this year. Woodbine has long had a reputation as one of the best teams in Western Iowa and the fact that our boys held them down and actually had the best of the play is very gratifying.

The new rules make it very difficult to score as a ten yards gain is very hard to make where the teams are at all evenly matched. If Denison would only rally to the support of its team we believe they would make a championship record before the season ends.

Dr. J. W. Kime the tuberculosis specialist will deliver an illustrated lecture on "The White Plague" next Sunday evening at the Presbyterian church. This will be a union service and all are invited to attend. The subject is one of greatest importance as consumption annually claims thousands of victims. The lecture is well illustrated and while scientific is not technical and can be easily understood by all, and a large audience should greet him.

The work which Dr. Kime is doing is of the most important nature. His mission is to tell people how to live long and have full enjoyment of perfect health. His lectures are full of interest and his illustrations drive home the many useful lessons that are presented in a pleasing and popular manner.

Dr. Kime has for more than twenty years been engaged in the arduous duties of an extensive practice in his profession as a result he brings a wealth of knowledge from a practical stand point before his hearers. He was the founder, and for many years the editor, of the Iowa Medical Journal, and is now giving his entire attention to the treatment of Tuberculosis at his Sanatorium for this disease at Fort Dodge, Iowa.

He is a member of the Iowa State Medical Association and of numerous other medical and scientific societies and holds the position of Lecturer on Tuberculosis in the Department of the State University of Iowa.

WELL KNOWN CITIZEN DEAD

Maurice Brosnahan Succumbs to Paralysis After Years of Suffering

On the morning of Wednesday Oct. 17th, death claimed one of Denison's well known and highly respected citizens, Mr. Maurice Brosnahan. For many years he had been an invalid at his home west of Denison being a victim of creeping paralysis. During all the years of suffering he was patient and uncomplaining and the loving members of his household did all that was within their power to ease his pain and to give him comfort. Mr. Brosnahan was fifty-four years old at time of his death. He was born at Knock Brack, County Carey, Ireland and came to America in 1872. He first settled in Auburn, New York where he was married to Miss Sarah Henry. He came to Denison in 1880, working six years for the Northwestern railroad company and later taking up farming. He has been an invalid for nearly twelve years. Mr. and Mrs. Brosnahan were the parents of eleven children, nine of whom survive their father. The sons are, Rev. Father Edward Brosnahan, of Rome, Italy; Joseph Oragan, Idaho, John of Danbury, Iowa and Maurice, Robert and William at home. The daughters are, Julia, who is known as Sister Constantia of the order of St. Francis at Otter Creek, Iowa; Mrs. Mary Wolf of Spencer, Neb. and Lizzie who is at home. Besides his wife and children he leaves a number of relatives to mourn his death. Funeral services will be held at St. Rose of Lima church on Friday morning at 10 a. m. Rev. Father Farrelly officiating. Mr. Brosnahan was a kindly, honest Christian man, a good father and a good citizen. There are many who will mourn his loss.
