First National Bank of Schleswig to Organize With Fifty-Thousand Dollars Capital

CHARTER IS AWAITED.

First National Bank of Schleswig will Organize With Fifty-Thousand Dollars Capital

The German Bank of Schleswig is about to become the First National Bank of Schleswig, with a capital of \$50,000.00. The papers have been drawn and forwarded to Washington and all that now remains is to receive a charter, elect officers and commence business. It is entirely probable that Mr. B. F. Andersen will continue as cashier and the directorate will be largely the same as that of the present institution. For a number of years this bank has been operated most successfully as one of the banks affiliated with the Crawford State Bank of Denison. Under the new charter these relations will continue and aside from the safety guaranteed by the National banking law it will have back of it some of the strongest financial interest of the county. The increase in the capital, from \$25,000.00 to \$50,000.00 is a notable one and places the Schleswig bank in the first rank at the very start. This will give Schleswig exceptional banking facilities and is another marked proof of the growth and prosperity of our neighboring city.


