

SHAW TO WITHDRAW.

President Finally Accedes to Secretary's Repeated Request.

CORTLEYOU TO SUCCEED.

After Five Years of Splendid Service Famous Denison Man Will Resign March First.

Definite announcement is made this week that President Roosevelt has finally acceded to Secretary Shaw's repeated requests that he might withdraw from the Cabinet and give up his position as Secretary of the Treasury.

We do not believe, in all the history of the Treasury department any man has made more persistent efforts to resign and been met with more urgent requests to remain in office. It was Mr. Shaw's intention to resign more than a year ago, but owing to the pressing requests of the President, and the number of knotty problems remaining to be solved, he consented to prolong his period of office.

We believe further that no man has met the difficulties of this office more faithfully and well than has Secretary Shaw. While in many departments of the government frauds and loose administration have been unearthed, there has been no suspicion of scandal in the Treasury department, during his administration. Many perplexing situations have arisen during his administration and he has met them all with a Solomon like wisdom which has been the admiration of his friends and the consternation of his enemies. It is remarkable that with the bitterness of factional strife in Iowa no one has been able to say one word against the administration of public trust by Leslie M. Shaw.

Not only this, but Mr. Shaw is today the most popular and most effective republican orator in the United States. He looms above all other men as the apostle of republicanism. Some men need a close perspective to make visible their glory. Secretary Shaw is not one of these. We believe that Iowa will grow to be prouder and prouder of him as the years go by.

As to Secretary Shaw's future

plans we are not fully advised. We do know that the honor of being Secretary of the Treasury has meant a pecuniary sacrifice to him of not less than one hundred thousand dollars and that it has been worth many times that amount to the people of the United States that they have had his services.

We have always been in hope that Mr. Shaw would return to Denison and the simple life of days gone by. Here hundreds of friends await him, here are all the associates of those early days when life was a struggle and friends were needed.

The Review and its editor have always been proud of the humble part they played in bringing Mr. Shaw to the attention of the people of Iowa, and through them to the whole nation. The editor is proud of the fact that he wrote the first mention of Leslie M. Shaw as a political factor, that ever appeared in a Chicago paper. He is proud of the fact that he was one of the coteries of Denison, friends who busied themselves 'night and day for weeks in introducing Mr. Shaw to the people of Iowa as a candidate for Governor.

We wish to say now that the public career of Mr. Shaw has fully justified every word of praise which the Review and his Denison friends have ever uttered concerning him. Whether the acceptance of his resignation on March 1st, 1908 shall mark the close of his public career or not, he has already left an indelible impress upon the history of his country.

Secretary Shaw will return to his Crawford county friends on Nov. 5th. While he will talk politics to the people, let us make his home coming an ovation in every way worthy the time, the place and the man.

ALL DENISON MOURNS

Death of H. H. Savage Casts Gloom Over All.

DIES AT PHOENIX, ARIZONA.

Battle Against the Dread White Plague Ends Fatally For Former Superintendent.

Prof. H. H. Savage died at Phoenix, Arizona on the morning of Sunday Oct. 21st. The mortal remains of the beloved man were taken at once to his home at Brighton, Iowa, where Rev. W. E. Bryce will officiate at the obsequies on to-morrow, Friday afternoon.

Mr. Savage was taken with a severe cold and cough last spring. But he did not allow it to take him from his work as the head of the schools of West Waterloo. Mr. Savage never allowed anything to take him from his work. Later, while teaching in the summer school at Cedar Falls he was taken with severe hemorrhage and it was only by the best of care that his life was saved at the time.

Ever since that time his hundreds of Denison friends have been anxious about him and have fondly hoped for his recovery. He resigned his position in Waterloo, but so greatly had his single year of service been appreciated that his resignation was not accepted and he was given a year's leave of absence instead. As soon as he was able he was taken to his old home at Brighton and but last week he was taken to Phoenix, Arizona.

Up to the last he retained all the vigor of his splendid intellect and we will cherish the memory of a brief note he dictated to us but three days before his death. Mr. Savage came from Brighton, Iowa, and worked his way both through the State Normal and the State University.

He chose to make teaching his profession and he desired the best possible preparation for his life work.

For five years he was Superintendent of the schools of Denison. His work here was a success. Never has a better, truer, more able man been connected with the schools of Denison. Never has a nobler Christian gentleman lived in our city. He received many tempting offers to accept

positions in other cities, and finally he was prevailed upon to go to Waterloo. There was not a person in Denison who parted with him without regret. The school board of Waterloo sent a committee here to investigate thoroughly before offering him the position. They found no man in Denison who did not sing his praises and who did not deeply regret his leaving.

Had his health remained to him he was destined to become one of the great men of his profession. He had the ability, the thoroughness, the knowledge, the gentle tactfulness, the ability to see and do the right thing. Above all else, he had that fine sense of honor, that Christian manliness which carried him through all the rough places of life successfully. It was through his more than through those of any one other man that Denison has today its splendid library. While the stone shall stand as a monument to the beneficence of Andrew Carnegie, the spirit, the soul, the very life of the institution shall remain a monument to H. H. Savage, the man whose gentle insistence bought it all about.

We mourn Mr. Savage, personally, as one of the best friends we have ever known in Denison. He had the rare combination of brains and energy and down-right goodness which is but too seldom seen.

We are glad to say that Denison people appreciated him fully during his lifetime and that young and old are a unit in mourning his untimely death.

For the young wife, who came here to share life's joys and sorrows with him, we have nothing but tears and heart ache and tenderest words of consolation. She was brave and sweet and true, a real help-mate to him in every way. All her life she must have the consolation that she was all in all to him and that her love brightened all his days.

We cannot fathom the Almighty wisdom which took him from this world where his example and his teachings were so badly needed. There are so many of us who could be better spared. We do know that his young life left an impress, an influence for good that will be felt by all who knew him.
