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JUST TWO SURVIVE.

Klinker and McHenry Only Republicans Elected
THE COUNTY GOES SLUMP.

Theobald and the Rest Get Buried in Landslide Republicans Beat County Ticket In Anti-Cummins Zeal.

Klinker and McHenry are the republican heroes. All the remainder of the splendid ticket lies slaughtered by republican votes. Everything went in the mad rush to give Porter a majority and thus to vindicate Shaw, who but the day before had asked republicans to stand by their ticket. Such splendid men as Theobald, Houlihan, Johnson, Pahl, Maynard, Sweet, Schultz Woolston, Carey, Meisner and Thompson were slaughtered in the carnival of republican scorching. Uncle Morris pulled through as a matter of course and Klinker's German friends together with Shaw Van's democratic enemies, saved him in spite of all that Denison republicans could do. The rural republicans did manfully, they got out their vote and stood by the whole ticket, but Denison. Charter Oak and Vail held high carnival, cutting and slashing the ticket from head to foot. The vote from Jackson township is sealed up and no one seems to be able to give the figures, but it cannot change the results in the county.

There is now much regret among republicans over the slaughter they have effected but it is now too late to mend. Next week we shall discuss the individual contests, but will not do so at this time.

Klinker is the hero of the hour running nearly a thousand ahead of his ticket, although he lost 300 in Denison from his vote of two years ago. It was a splendid personal victory for him and a crushing defeat for his opponent. Had he not had the help of all the old time democratic leaders, however, even his great popularity throughout the county would not have availed against the republican scratches. SEC'Y SHAW DRAWS CROWDS

But Meetings Fail to Bring Votes to Republican Ticket.

The meetings held by Secretary Shaw at Manilla and Denison were largely attended although the Charter Oak meeting was a good deal of a failure.

The roman candle parade proved a success and was as pretty a pageant as Denison has ever seen. The line of march was short but the sky was kept fairly ablaze with the many colored balls of fire, which told the people for miles around that Shaw was home.

Long before the close of the parade in fact, before it was fairly started, the opera house was filled to its greatest capacity. Not an inch of space was left unfilled. Chairs were obtained and the Review Lodge Hall was used for an overflow meeting. This room was quickly packed and hundreds of people were unable to get into either hall.

Sears McHenry acted as chairman of the opera house meeting, while F. W. Meyers presided at the overflow. Congressman Conner, Congressman Littlefield and Secretary Shaw spoke in the order named, at the opera house. While Shaw, Conner, Littlefield was the program at the overflow. Secretary Shaw did not get to the opera house meeting until 9.30 and he spoke until nearly midnight, but the crowd was not wearied and it was the condition of the Secretary's voice, rather than the wish of the people which prevented the meeting from lasting until election day.

Mr. Shaw spoke for the whole ticket and urged republicans to vote for Cummins, he did not at the same time attempt to conceal the fact that he was not in sympathy with the Governor's position in many ways.

The course taken by the Secretary was a consistent one and we can but wish that more of the republicans had taken him seriously and remained true to the head of the ticket. Congressman Littlefield proved himself a great speaker and he made a stirring address for republicanism and also paid an eloquent tribute to his friend Judge Conner. Congressman Conner contented himself with a brief speech of patriotism at each meeting. Congressman Littlefield tells us that the Denison rally was the largest and best he has attended this year.

The Manilla people gave Secretary Shaw a splendid reception on Monday morning. Notwithstanding the fact that the meeting was in the forenoon the opera house was filled and the people listened attentively until long after the noon whistle blew. At night the Manilla republicans had another grand round-up. Senator Saunders of Council Bluffs was the main speaker and he was followed by the local boys in a series of short speeches which were received with shouts of approval. The Manilla republicans did the best work possible this fall and they are entitled to the thanks of the republicans of the county.

The Shaw meeting at Charter Oak was not as well attended as had been hoped and the arrangements were not perfected. Nevertheless the Secretary spoke to a fair sized audience and his speech was splendidly received.

At Schleswig Congressman Littlefield and Congressman Conner addressed a fair sized crowd of business men and such of the farmers as could get away from the alluring corn-fields.

A NEW OPERA HOUSE

The rally held on Monday night emphasized the need of a new opera house. The present building is inadequate, unfit, and absolutely dangerous. Had there been any panic on Monday night Denison would have been a house of mourning today. The hotel is all right, we are glad that it is being built. The hotel will be more for the benefit of strangers than for ourselves, however, and will come into direct competition with those who are now trying to make an honest living in the hotel business.

The opera house would compete with no one and would be something which we could enjoy ourselves. Every person in Denison would use the opera house sometime during the year.

We hope nothing will be allowed to interfere with the opera house proposition. We need a hall that will comfortably seat 1000 people, we need a hall that is well furnished and well ventilated. We need a hall that is as near fire proof as possible and that has ample exits for use in emergencies.

In our opinion it will add much more to the comfort and refinement of our city than will the hotel. We will have a better class of entertainments and will be able better to enjoy them.
