REPUBLICANS WILL HAVE A LEAD OF SIXTY.

GOOD WORKING MAJORITY LEFT

Fight for Representatives Results in Some Gains for Democrats in the Sixtieth Congress—Full Returns From All Districts.

Chicago, Nov. 8.—Returns up to 1 o'clock show that the Republicans have elected 223 congressmen and Democrats 163, as follows:

BRUCE LOSING IN NEW YORK

Chanler Seems to Have Won in Light of Later Returns.

New York, Nov. 8.—There is still doubt as to who is elected lieutenant governor. Sixteen counties have not reported the official count, but on the face of the figures in hand the result seems to favor Lewis Stuyvesant Chanler, on the Democratic-Independence league ticket.

Charles E. Hughes, Republican candidate for governor, has a majority of about 52,000.

It appears that outside of the candidates for governor and possibly for lieutenant governor, the Democratic ticket is elected.

FLOYD FAILS TO GET MAJORITY

New Hampshire Governorship Will Have to Be Settled in Legislature.

Concord, N. H., Nov. 8.—The returns from the state election indicate quite conclusively that the contest for the governorship will have to be settled in the legislature, the Republican candidate, Charles M. Floyd, having twelve counties still out. Democrats failed to secure a majority over the other two candidates.

The returns from 275 of the 291 wards and towns of the state give Floyd 39,948; Jackson (Dem.), 37,128; Feltley (Pro.), 2,129; scattering, 874. This is a Republican loss from four years ago of 5,164.

COLORADO IN G. O. P. LIST.

Entire State Ticket is Elected—Legislature Is Republican.

Denver, Nov. 8.—So extensive was the scratching that no county in Colorado has made a complete return of its vote. Sufficient returns have been received, however, to make certain the election of the entire Republican state ticket and of from sixty to seventy of the 100 members of the legislature, insuring the election of a Republican to succeed Senator Patterson.

Unionists Win in Porto Rico.

San Juan, P. R., Nov. 8.—The Unionist party scored an overwhelming victory at the polls, carrying all the seven districts of the island. The Republicans are left without representation in the next house of delegates. The Unionists won in a majority of the municipalities.

STUART WINS IN PENNSYLVANIA

Republican Candidate Elected Governor by Over 100,000 Plurality.

Philadelphia, Nov. 7.—The most exciting campaign in Pennsylvania in twenty-five years has ended in a triumph for Edwin S. Stuart (Rep.), for governor, over Lewis Emery, Jr., (Dem. and Lincoln party) by a plurality that the Republican leaders claim will reach 100,000.

The incoming legislature will be strongly Republican, although not so overwhelmingly for that party as it was two years ago.

Of the congressional contests, the hottest was that against John Dalzell, one of the Republican floor leaders. Complete returns from all the Pennsylvania congressional districts give the Republicans twenty-six and the Democrats six. The Democrats had only one representative from the state in the present congress.

INDIANA REPUBLICAN: 30,000.

Democrats Gain Two Congressmen in Hoosier State.

Indianapolis, Nov. 8.—According to the latest returns received throughout the state, Indiana went about 30,000 Republican in Tuesday's election. The Democrats gained two congressmen, one from the Eighth and one from the Eleventh districts, making the delegation nine Republicans and four Democrats.

IDAHO REPUBLICANS VICTORS.

Late Returns Indicate Gooding Has Been Elected Governor.

Boise, Ida., Nov. 8.—Late returns confirm the estimates that Governor Gooding, Republican candidate for reelection, has carried the state by a majority of somewhat more than 7,000.

Definite returns show that the Republicans have thirteen of the twenty-one members of the state senate and thirty-five of the fifty-one members of the house. This will give a majority of twenty-four on joint ballot.

MCREARY LOSES IN KENTUCKY

His Successor in the Senate Will Be Governor Beckham.

Louisville, Nov. 8.—With but a few mountain counties to hear from, and these probably increasing his lead, Governor Beckham has almost certainly won his fight against Senator McCreary for the nomination for the United States senatorship in the Democratic primaries.

London Press Comment on Election.

London, Nov. 8.—All the morning newspapers publish long editorial articles on the result of the election in New York state. Few of them say anything of the results in other states. With scarcely an exception, they comment on the close vote as an indication of the popular discontent with enormous combinations of capital.

Close in California.

San Francisco, Nov. 8.—Seven hundred and ninety-one precincts out of 2,471 in the state, minus Los Angeles and Alameda counties, which are usually heavily Republican, give Gillett (Rep.), for governor, 40,148; Bell (Dem.), 40,719; Langdon (Ind.), 17,033.

South Dakota 25,000 Republican.

Sioux Falls, S. D., Nov. 8.—Returns from 39 of the 50 counties of the state give Crawford (Rep.) for governor and the state ticket a majority of 25,570. Republicans have elected 112 members of the legislature, Democrats 17.

CONTEST IN KANSAS CLOSE

GOVERNOR HOCH'S MAJORITY IS LESS THAN FIVE THOUSAND.

DEMOCRATS STILL CLAIM STATE

Declare Harris Has Won by 3,300. Incomplete Returns Show Republican Candidate Ahead of Opponent. Rest of Ticket Wins.

Topeka, Kan., Nov. 8.—The reelection of Governor E. W. Hoch (Rep.) seems reasonably certain, although the Democratic committee still claims the state for W. A. Harris by a plurality of 3,300. According to figures received by the Republican committee, 97 counties out of 105 give Hoch a plurality of 4,150. The Democrats claim that their figures on the same counties give Harris a plurality of nearly 2,000 and that the official returns will give him over 3,000.

Big Democratic gains have been made in the lower house of the legislature, but that body will still be overwhelmingly Republican and a member of the dominant party will be elected United States senator to succeed A. W. Benson, who is himself a candidate for reelection. Other candidates are Congressman Charles Curtis and Joseph L. Bristow.

CUMMINS DEFEATS PORTER

Re-elected by a Plurality of at Least Twenty Thousand.

Des Moines, Nov. 8.—Returns in Iowa are still incomplete, but there is every reason to believe that Cummins will receive at least 23,000 plurality over Porter (Dem.). The early returns received on election night were discouraging to the Republican managers, but they came from unfavorable districts and later reports continued to increase Cummins' lead.

NEBRASKA 15,000 REPUBLICAN

Entire State Ticket, Five Congressmen and Legislature Elected.

Lincoln, Nov. 8.—Complete returns from thirty-three counties give Sheldon (Rep.), for governor, 55,252; Shallenberger (Dem.), 45,428. Compared with two years ago, this shows a Democratic loss of 5,728, and indicates a plurality in the state for Sheldon of 15,000.

NORTH DAKOTA FOR BURKE.

Republicans Concede Election of Democratic Candidate for Governor.

Fargo, N. D., Nov. 8.—"We concede the defeat of Governor Sarles by Mr. Burke, his Democratic opponent, by a probable plurality of 2,000," said Chairman L. B. Hanna of the Republican state central committee.

DEMOCRATS SWEEP MISSOURI

Elect State Ticket and Twelve Out of Sixteen Congressmen.

St. Louis, Nov. 8.—From nearly complete returns from all counties, the Democrats have carried the state by a plurality of 7,650, electing all candidates on the state ticket and twelve out of the sixteen congressmen. The Republicans elected congressmen in Kansas City and St. Louis, but lost all the districts in the state which had been swept into the Republican ranks two years ago.

Virginia.

Richmond, Va., Nov. 8.—The Democrats carried all the congressional districts except the Ninth, in which Slamp (Rep.) is re-elected by a reduced majority.

New Mexico for Statehood.

Albuquerque, N. M., Nov. 8.—Fairly complete returns from twenty-five counties give statehood a majority of 6,900.

REPUBLICANS CARRY OHIO

Elect Entire State Ticket by a Safe Majority.

Columbus, Nov. 7.—The indications are that the Republicans have elected Thompson, secretary of state, and their entire state ticket by a safe majority. Chairman Dick of the Republican state committee said at 10:30 p. m.: "Returns from Republican county chairmen show the election of the entire state ticket by a plurality exceeding 75,000."

Senator Dick, chairman of the state Republican committee, sent the following telegram to President Roosevelt: "Ohio Republican by not less than 75,000 and elects seventeen Republican congressmen, three Democrats, with one district in doubt."

Democrats Win in Oklahoma.

Guthrie, Okla., Nov. 7.—The constitution of the new state of Oklahoma will be written by Democrats. Vernon Whiting, secretary of the Oklahoma Republican central committee, concedes the Democrats 73 delegates, while Chairman Jesse Dunn of the Democratic committee says there will be at least 78 Democratic delegates on the floor of the convention.

Utah.

Salt Lake, Nov. 7.—The Republicans in Utah have elected their state ticket by the usual plurality, returning Joseph Howell to congress and electing Joseph E. Frick justice of the supreme court. In Salt Lake county, where the American, or anti-Mormon party centered its efforts, the result is in doubt.

Texas.

Austin, Tex., Nov. 7.—Notwithstanding excellent weather and the efforts of political leaders, the total vote cast was small, comparatively speaking, not exceeding 400,000 votes all told, some 135,000 of which represents the combined vote of the Republicans, the Socialists and the Prohibition party.

South Carolina.

Charleston, Nov. 7.—The election held in South Carolina was without incident and a very small vote was polled. Governor P. M. Ansell (Dem.) and the entire state ticket was elected, the only opposition being J. L. Chandler, who received half a hundred Socialist votes.

Mississippi.

Jackson, Nov. 7.—The election in Mississippi passed off without interest, practically the vote being light in each of the congressional districts. The Democratic candidates were without opposition, the usual old year majorities being given each of them.

Georgia.

Atlanta, Nov. 7.—The only election contest in Georgia was in the First congressional district, Edward (Dem.) was elected by a plurality of about 4,000. The three candidates for judges of the newly created court of appeals were unanimously elected.

Florida.

Jacksonville, Nov. 7.—All the Democratic candidates in Florida are elected. The legislature is probably unanimously Democratic. The proposition advocated by Governor Broward to drain the Everglades seems to be defeated.

New Mexico for Joint Statehood.

Albuquerque, N. M., Nov. 7.—Reports so far received indicate that the territory will go for joint statehood by from 4,000 to 7,000. Reports indicate the election of Andrews (Rep.) delegate to congress.

Tennessee.

Nashville, Nov. 7.—Reports show Patterson (Dem.), for governor, received the usual off year majorities in middle Tennessee, which indicates his election by from 25,000 to 30,000.

Connecticut.

New Haven, Nov. 7.—Returns show that large Republican majorities have been returned for the entire state ticket, the four district congressmen and for congressman at large.

New Hampshire.

Concord, Nov. 7.—Seventy-five towns and wards out of 290 in New Hampshire gave for governor: Floyd (Rep.), 8,002; Jameson (Dem.), 6,415.

HUGHES WINS IN NEW YORK

HIS PLURALITY IN EMPIRE STATE IS ABOUT 52,000.

REST OF TICKET STILL IN DOUBT

Hearst Carries Greater New York, Buffalo, Rochester, Utica, Troy, Elmira and Some Other Cities—Republicans Gain in Rural Districts.

New York, Nov. 7.—According to incomplete returns from all over the state, Charles E. Hughes, the Republican candidate, has been elected governor of New York over William Randolph Hearst by approximately a plurality of 52,000.

Outside of Greater New York, with 100 election districts missing, Hughes had a plurality of about 124,000. In Greater New York, with 69 election districts missing, Hearst had a plurality of 75,036.

As was generally expected, Mr. Hearst showed his greatest strength in the cities through the state and took out of the Republican column a number of the more important municipalities which heretofore have been Republican. Among the cities which gave Hearst a plurality were Buffalo, Rochester, Utica, Troy, Elmira, Rome, Little Falls and Jamestown.

State Senator Thomas F. Grady of Tammany Hall has been re-elected over Thomas Rock, who has been known in the campaign as "Eight-Hour" Rock, and who claimed he had been "tricked" by the Independence league.

There were many odd turns to the balloting. Here in New York, it was Richmond borough that defeated Mr. Hearst for mayor a year ago and it was Brooklyn, with a big plurality, which helped him to make the race so close. Mr. Hearst barely carried Brooklyn yesterday, but ran ahead in Richmond, in Schenectady, one of the best organized labor cities in the United States, it was expected Mr. Hearst would have a substantial plurality.

Election Night Crowds.

New York turned out its myriads of people last night for the usual election night revel. All the pent-up enthusiasm of an unprecedented state campaign was vented in a frenzy of noise. Broadway from Forty-second to Fourteenth street and along Park Row, from the Brooklyn bridge to the end of "newspaper row," was one mass of shouting, shoving people. Of noise, there was every variety it was possible to create with the use of a good pair of lungs and a tin horn, a cow bell or other devices. It was a boisterous crowd, but good natured. Beginning at Times square, at Forty-second street, Broadway was impassable to everything except pedestrians as far down town as Twenty-third street. The greatest crushes were around Times square, Herald, Madison square and Park Row.

California.

San Francisco, Nov. 7.—General George Stone, chairman of the Republican state central committee, said to the Associated Press: "Reports from the state are coming in very slowly. There is no doubt as to the result, it is only a question of plurality. Gillett has carried San Francisco by a plurality of from 5,000 to 1,000, and the entire Republican state ticket, including eight congressmen, has been elected by a plurality exceeding 25,000."

Washington.

Seattle, Nov. 7.—Late returns point to an overwhelming Republican victory in the state of Washington. W. E. Humphrey, Wesley L. Jones and Francis W. Cushman, congressmen-at-large, all Republicans, will be returned. The house of representatives and state senate will be strongly Republican.

Nevada.

Reno, Nov. 7.—Vote counting, which is proceeding slowly, indicates a Democratic-Silver party victory. Sparks, for governor, is running ahead of Mitchell in all quarters. Returns show Sparks, Bartlett, for congress, and Sweeney, for justice of the supreme court, in the lead.

Wyoming.

Cheyenne, Nov. 7.—The entire Republican state ticket has been elected by good majorities and the legislature, which will elect a senator, will be overwhelmingly Republican.

Maryland.

Baltimore, Nov. 7.—Maryland's delegation in the sixtieth congress will be three Republicans and three Democrats, proportionately the same as at present.

Alabama.

Montgomery, Ala., Nov. 7.—Returns indicate an overwhelming victory for the Democratic ticket and nominees for congress.

MORAN SWAMPED IN BAY STATE

Guild Re-elected Governor of Massachusetts by Increased Plurality.

Boston, Nov. 7.—The Republicans were victors in the state election, Governor Guild being re-elected by a considerably increased plurality over last year, while his opponent, District Attorney John B. Moran of Boston, the candidate of the Democratic and the Prohibition party and independence league, received a somewhat larger vote than that given the Democratic candidate a year ago. With two-thirds of the state vote tabulated, Mr. Guild's plurality was estimated at about 37,000. The Republicans re-elected their entire state ticket, although Lieutenant Governor Draper fell considerably behind Governor Guild. The next legislature will be Republican by the usual large majority in both houses and this will insure the re-election of United States Senator W. Murray Crane of Dalton. The Massachusetts delegation to congress will remain practically the same.

The outcome of the election was a considerable disappointment to Mr. Moran and his fellow campaigners, E. Gerry Brown or Brockton, candidate for lieutenant governor and George Fred Williams of Dedham. The Moran campaign was handicapped by lack of organization, a meager campaign fund and opposition from a large number of former leaders. The vote came from the wage earners principally, as was shown by the strong indorsement given the Suffolk county district attorney in nearly all the mill cities and other industrial centers.

Illinois.

Chicago, Nov. 7.—The indications are that John F. Smuisk (Rep.), for state treasurer, has been elected by a majority of from 100,000 to 125,000. Scratching of ballots in Cook county was so extensive that returns were unusually slow.

Indications are that Strassheim, Republican candidate for sheriff, and John R. Thompson, Republican candidate for county treasurer, are victorious by 25,000. Louis Rinaker, Republican candidate for county judge, has a plurality of 20,000. The new municipal court judges will all be Republicans, and the assistant states attorney, Olsen, has been elected chief justice. A possible exception to the election of Republican judges for the municipal court is Barrett, a colored nominee, who was scratched heavily.

Wisconsin.

Milwaukee, Nov. 7.—The Republican state ticket, headed by Governor James D. Davidson, swept the state by an estimated plurality of at least 40,000 over John A. Aylward, the Democratic candidate, and his colleagues. Returns showed the election of nine Republicans and one Democratic congressman, and one district, the Third, still in doubt. Special returns to the Sentinel from the Third congressional district indicate the election of James W. Murphy (Dem.) over Congressman James W. Babcock (Rep.) by an estimated plurality of 3,000.

Minnesota.

St. Paul, Nov. 7.—Governor Johnson has been re-elected governor of Minnesota over his Republican opponent, A. L. Cole, by a majority of at least 30,000. This majority for a Democratic candidate is unprecedented in Minnesota. Four years ago Van Sant (Rep.) was elected governor by a majority of 50,000.

Michigan.

Detroit, Nov. 7.—Governor Warner and the entire Republican state ticket have been elected by 70,000 majority. The Republican congressional candidates in all of the twelve Michigan districts have been elected and the Republicans will have a large majority in the state legislature, with a possibility of its entire membership.

Wadsworth Defeated for Congress.

New York, Nov. 7.—It is officially announced at Republican national congressional headquarters that James W. Wadsworth (Rep.) has been defeated for congress in the Thirty-fourth New York district. The information to the effect was received in a telegram from Mr. Wadsworth himself to Chairman Sherman.

West Virginia.

Wheeling, W. Va., Nov. 7.—Partial returns from scattered counties in West Virginia show the probable success of all five of the Republican congressional nominees. The legislature will be Republican, with the present joint ballot majority of 57, insuring the re-election of Senator S. B. Elliott.

Republicans Carry Delaware.

Wilmington, Nov. 7.—The Republicans have carried Delaware and elected Burton for congress over Marvel (Dem.). They will also control the Delaware legislature that will elect a successor to United States Senator Albee (Rep.).

Montana.

Butte, Nov. 7.—Incomplete returns from the state indicate the election to congress of Charles N. Pray and Henry C. Smith, candidate for the state supreme court. Republicans appear to have made gains throughout the state.

Arkansas.

Little Rock, Ark., Nov. 7.—The Democratic candidates for congress were elected in every district of Arkansas. The vote was light in all districts except the Fourth, where a hard fight was made.
