### GERMANIA TAKES ACTION.

Makes Proposition to Denison Improvement Company

Sometime ago the Germania Verein appointed a committee of three to meet with a like committee of the Denison improvement Co. to come to an understanding as to what value should be placed on the old opera house and as to how much stock should be given in exchange for it. The two committees agreed on the price of \$7000. the Denison Improvement Co. to pay off an indebtedness of \$1500 now against the property and to give to the stockholders \$5500 in stock in the new company. The Germania Verein met last night but it did not approve of the finding of the two committees but in place made a counter proposition. The proposition they made to the Denison Improvement Co. is for the new company to pay off the old indebtedness of Germania and to pay \$7000 in stock and that this will only be accepted on the condition that the new opera house be erected on the same location where the old one now stands.

It is now up to the Denison Improvement Co. and things do not look very bright for the two organizations to come to an understanding and agreement. The Denison Improvement Co. had planned on erecting the opera house on the McAhren lot and for the present at least to let the old opera house stand until the new one would be completed, and then in the future to use the old building for dances only or to move it away and to erect a fine business house on the corner. Germania however will not listen to any other proposition than to have the new building erected on the old site. A new opera house is badly needed and by all means the two organizations should come to an agreement so that work will be started on a new opera house next spring.

The reports of the manager for the past five months were read at the Germania meeting and it turned out to be a record breaker. The manager turned into the Verein a net profit of \$650 for five months.

### A FEMALE TRAMP.

She was poorly clad and said that her name was Mrs. Miller, residing at West Side and that she had walked to Denison from that town that evening.
