Next December will Witness Great Poultry Show in Denison.

The next show of the association will be held in Denison on December 12, 13, and 14th of 1907. The poultrymen of Denison and vicinity have been working to get this poultry show for some time and have at last succeeded. They are very much interested and very enthusiastic and intend to leave nothing undone to make the show in Denison next December the best show that the association has ever held. Denison and Crawford county have some of the most successful poultry fanciers there are in the United States. Although many may not know it, Crawford county people have been represented and has taken many prizes in various poultry shows all over the United States. These people are now thoroughly interested and intend to put forth their most strenuous efforts to out-do all former efforts. It is confidently expected that there will be between one thousand and fifteen hundred chickens at the show, representing most of the

breeds of chickens raised in the country.

The association has secured the services of Frank Heck of Chicago, one of the best poultrymen in the country, to score the birds and award the prizes, if more help is needed no efforts will be spared to get the best that can be had.

This is to be the fourth annual show of the Boyer Valley Association and will surpass all the other shows that have been held by the association. The record of the association has been a surprise to every body. They have created a great deal of enthusiasm among the chicken fanciers of this part of the state and have greatly encouraged the breeding of the Great American Hen.

The association has joined in the petition of the other poultry raisers of the state requesting the General Assembly of Iowa to appropriate one thousand dollars annually to the State Poultry show. This show is held at Des Moines and it is to be hoped that the legislature will grant their request as Iowa cannot afford to be behind other states in the breeding of poultry as in this state more than any other the industry of the people is in poultry raising.

Must Pay Mrs. Bonar Heavy Damages.

WORK OF DISTRICT COURT.

Grand Jurys Report is Expected Tomorrow—Said that Hassans will be Indicted.

Judge F. M. Powers arrived Monday noon and convened the second week of the district court. The first jury of the court for the present term was called. The jurors were nearly all on hand but some of them presenting excuses were excused from duty and allowed to go home but enough were left to be sure of getting a jury every time for the trial of the cases.

The first case assigned for trial was Rollins vs Fitzgerald, being an action for the appointment of a guardian for Mrs. Fitzgerald who is now in the state insane hospital. M. E. Jones was appointed guardian and there was no trial.

The case of Bonar vs Lane and The American Bonding Co. of Baltimore was the first case in which there was a trial. This is an action brought by Sarah Bonar against Ed Lane and The American Bonding Co. of Baltimore. Ed Lane was in the saloon business in Dow City and had as security on his mule tax bond The American Bonding Co. The husband of Sarah Bonar procured liquor from this saloon and was injured thereby thus causing damage to his wife, the plaintiff in this action. The cause was pursued to judgment against Ed Lane and a judgment for \$1800.00 was secured. The case was continued at that time as to the American Bonding Company and came up for trial at this time.

The case was one containing many fine points of law and each step taken in the trial was fought over and every thing covered, thus taking nearly three days for the trial. The plaintiff relied upon the contention that Ed Lane secured the bond of Geo. Richardson who held himself out to be, and as a matter of fact had been acting for a long time, as agent for the American Bonding Co. in the execution of like bonds, and in fact had executed about twenty-five such bonds.

The defendant represented by Jacob Sims of the firm of Shaw Sims & Kuehne made a motion to the court to direct a verdict for the defendant on the ground that Geo. Richardson had no authority to execute the bond in suit. The court over ruled the motion and ruled that there was sufficient evidence to take the case to the jury.

The plaintiff represented by Mr. Bailey of Dunlap by Mr. Lally moved the court to direct a verdict for the plaintiff on the ground that the defendant had allowed Mr. Richardson to act in the capacity, he exercised, in executing mule tax bonds for so long a period that they would stopp from denying his authority as to this bond as it affected the rights of third parties. This motion was overruled by the court as the court thought the case should go to the jury. A great deal of evidence was introduced on each side and after the arguments the case was submitted to the jury, which after being out most of the night decided in favor of the plaintiff. Thus making the bonding company liable upon its bond to the amount of the verdict against Lane for the sum of \$1800. and costs. The case was hard fought on each side, and probably will be appealed to the Supreme Court.

The case of Rose vs Eggers is the next case for trial and a hard fight is expected from both sides.

The case of Carrie Staininger vs. The City of Denison was continued to the next term of court.

It is reported that the Grand Jury will be ready to conclude its labors tomorrow, the rumor is also current that Joseph and Solomon Hassan have been indicted on that such action will be included in the Grand Jury's report.

THE COUNCIL IN SESSION

Considers Passage of a Building Inspection Ordinance.

The city council met in regular session on Monday evening. After the regular business of allowing the bills of the month, the council took up some matters of importance.

The people living on Washington Avenue and adjacent thereto have petitioned the Council to construct a sanitary sewer from the North School building down Washington Avenue to connect with the Public School sewer. This matter has been under consideration by the Council for some time and the papers have all been prepared but the matter was laid on the table until all the members of the council could be present, as Mr. Lane is quarantined for diphtheria, and Mr. Mahler was out of town. The matter will be passed upon in the near future.

Fire Chief C. C. Kemming has recommended to the council that the city should have a building ordinance, controlling building in all parts of the city and especially regulating the construction of chimneys and flues, as most of the fires in the city are caused either by flues that are improperly constructed, or that have been neglected, and allowed to get out of repair. Under the ordinance contemplated the construction of flues would be regulated and all flues would be inspected to see that they were kept in repair. The ordinance would require every person who intended to build to get a permit from the building committee. Denison is now a city of sufficient size, to have such an ordinance, for many cities no larger than Denison have them, thus not only protecting property but life itself.
