## Proposed Resolution of Necessity.

Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Denison, Iowa;

That it is deemed advisable and necessary to make improvements by laying a sanitary sewer of eight (8) inch vitrified sewer pipe, to be laid in accordance with specifications furnished by the City Engineer and approved by the City Council of the City of Denison, Iowa, upon the following named streets and parts of streets, to wit:

On Anthony street, beginning at the intersection of Anthony street and Broadway and running south on Anthony street two blocks to the intersection of Anthony street and Walnut street, thence east one block on Walnut street to the intersection of Walnut and Dyer streets, thence south two blocks on Dyer street to the intersection of Dyer street and Rai road avenue, thence east one block on Railroad avenue to the intersection of Railroad avenue and Main street to connect with the public sewer at that place.

All expense of making said improvement to be charged to the property abutting thereon and property adjacent thereto to a distance of one hundred fifty (150) feet from said street line, in accordance with the law governing the same. And the contractor who shall make said improvement shall keep the same in repair for one year from the date of its acceptance by the said city.

Be it further resolved, that the City Council will meet at 9 o'clock a. m., on the 28th day of March, A. D. 1907 at the Council room in the City Hall, for the purpose of considering objections to said proposed resolution and that notice of said proposed resolution and of the passage of this resolution be published as provided by law.

## Articles of Incorporation of Oakland Cemetery Association, of Denison, Iowa.

ARTICLE I.  
We, the undersigned subscribers hereto, do hereby associate ourselves together, for the purpose of forming a Corporation to be known as Oakland Cemetery Association, of Denison, Iowa.

ARTICLE II.  
The object of the Corporation shall be the purchase of such lands for cemetery purposes, as shall be deemed necessary by the Association; the platting and selling of lots; and doing those things necessary for conducting and maintaining a cemetery association, including the purchase and taking over of the cemetery known as the Oakland Cemetery, heretofore owned by C. D. Miller, at Denison, Iowa.

ARTICLE III.  
The principal place of transacting business of the Corporation shall be Denison, Iowa.

ARTICLE IV.  
The authorized capital stock of the Corporation shall be Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) divided into shares of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) each. Twenty-five Hundred Dollars (\$2500.00) of which shall be paid in for the first year of business. Each share of stock shall be entitled to one vote at the meeting of the stockholders.

ARTICLE V.  
The stock of the Corporation shall be paid up and non-assessable.

ARTICLE VI.  
The indebtedness of the Corporation shall, at no time, exceed the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00).

ARTICLE VII.  
The private property of the stockholders shall be exempt from corporate debts.

ARTICLE VIII.  
The Association shall commence business on the 27th day of September, 1906, and sooner, if Twenty-five Hundred Dollars in stock is subscribed and paid in before said date, and it shall continue for a period of twenty years.

ARTICLE IX.  
The business of the Association shall be managed by a Board of Seven (7) Directors to be elected at the annual meeting from the stockholders of the Corporation: two to be elected for one year; two for two years; and two for three years; and until the next annual meeting, the following persons, to-wit: Mrs. B. Romans, J. P. Conner, O. M. Criswell, Secretary, and C. L. Voss, Treasurer.

ARTICLE X.  
The officers of this Association shall consist of a President, a Vice President, a Secretary and a Treasurer, to be elected by the Board of Directors, all of whom shall be stockholders in the Association. The President, Vice President, Treasurer and Directors shall serve without compensation, until the next annual meeting of the Corporation, which shall be on the second Monday in April of each year, the officers shall be as follows: W. J. Servier, President; Mrs. B. Romans, Vice President; O. M. Criswell, Secretary, and C. L. Voss, Treasurer.

ARTICLE XI.  
It shall be the duty of the President to preside over the meetings of the stockholders and also of the Directors, and to perform such other duties as may be prescribed in this Constitution, or by laws hereinafter to be adopted, as well as such other duties as usually devolve upon a presiding officer.

ARTICLE XII.  
It shall be the duty of the Vice President, in case of the absence or disability of the President, to perform the duties of President.

ARTICLE XIII.  
The Secretary shall keep a true and faithful record of all the proceedings of the Board of Directors and the meetings of the stockholders. He shall issue all notices to members of the Board of all meetings to be held, and notify the stockholders, representing a majority of the Board of their appointment and duties. He shall have charge of all books, records, deeds and papers, and the seal of the Association, and shall collect and receive all moneys and pay the same over to the Treasurer. He shall keep an accurate account of all funds and property received by him, belonging to the Association, and such papers as involve or represent matters of property of the Corporation.

ARTICLE XIV.  
The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds, and shall disburse the same, as the Board of Directors may direct, upon warrants signed by the President and counter signed by the Secretary. He shall give bonds to the Association, to be approved by the Board of Directors before entering upon the discharge of his duties, in such sum as the Board may require, and he shall present to the Board of Directors an annual statement (and of course, if required of a full and complete exhibit of the affairs of the Association, of all receipts and disbursements since the last report, and of all assets and liabilities accruing. The books and papers of the Treasurer shall, at all times, be open to the inspection of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE XV.  
The Association shall, out of the proceeds of the sale of lots, pay into a perpetuity or sinking fund twenty-five per cent of said proceeds, and twenty-five per cent thereof shall be devoted to improving and beautifying the grounds; and fifty percent of the proceeds shall be held subject to disposition by the Board of Directors, as in their judgment shall be deemed best for the Association.

ARTICLE XVI.  
Special meetings of the stockholders may be held, and it shall be the duty of the President of the Association to call such special meetings, when requested to do so by written request of a majority of the Board of Directors, or of the stockholders, representing a majority of the stock, and it shall be his duty to call a special meeting of the Board of Directors, at any time a majority of the Board may request him in writing to do so.

ARTICLE XVII.  
The transfer of lots of the Association shall be by deed, and in case of sale of lots by the Association, conveyance to be valid shall be signed by the President and counter signed by the Secretary. All warrants drawn upon the Treasurer for the payment of moneys shall be signed by the President and counter signed by the Secretary.

ARTICLE XVIII.  
Amendments to the Articles of Incorporation may be made at any annual meeting of the stockholders, or at a special meeting called for that purpose, upon the vote of a majority of the stock represented at such meeting.

ARTICLE XIX.  
The Board of Directors are authorized to adopt such by-laws as they may deem proper for the management of the business of the Association, and they are further authorized to employ a Superintendent, or any other assistants which they may deem necessary to carry out the purposes of the Association, and to pay such salary as they may deem advisable.

ARTICLE XX.  
Inasmuch as a large number of persons now own lots in the cemetery known as Oakland Cemetery, in Denison, Iowa, it is hereby recognized that each of the individuals thus owning lots in said cemetery shall continue to hold and own in this Corporation, the particular lots and interest which they now hold therein, the same as if this Corporation had been formed prior to their acquiring such lots, and they had acquired their title from the Corporation, and to carry out this purpose, the Corporation, when so authorized, is authorized and empowered, when requested by such owner, to execute to him a deed of conveyance, covering the lot or lots he may now own.

## Article XXI.

Each owner of a lot in the cemetery shall be considered a stockholder in the Corporation, and each lot shall constitute a share of the Corporation, and when more than one lot is owned by the same person, then he shall have as many shares issued to him, upon request, as he is owner of lots in the cemetery, and each share shall entitle the stockholder to one vote, and if more than one share, then he is to have as many votes as he is the owner of shares.

ARTICLE XXII.  
In case additional lots shall be required at any time for the purpose of the Association, the Board of Directors is hereby authorized, at any time they see fit, to purchase additional grounds, taking the deed therefor to the Corporation, and in case a sale of any lot or lots in said cemetery shall be made to any person, a deed shall be executed, in the name of the Corporation, signed by the President and counter signed by the Secretary, which deed shall convey the interest which the Corporation may have therein.

ARTICLE XXIII.  
The Corporation shall have and use a seal, on which shall be inscribed the words "Oakland Cemetery Association, Denison, Iowa."

ARTICLE XXIV.  
No one person shall be allowed to own or vote more than fifty shares of stock at any meeting of the stockholders.
