

# SHAW TO NEW YORK.

Accepts Position as Head of Carnegie Trust Co.

HAS PRINCELY SALARY.

Denison Friends Kept in The Dark Until Last Moment Shaw Will Return to Denison Soon.

The interesting question as to what Secretary Shaw would do when he left the cabinet has been solved by the positive announcement that he has accepted the Presidency of the Carnegie Trust Company, recently organized in New York. Secretary Shaw chose to keep even his most intimate friends in Denison in the dark as to his plans and the announcement was as much of a surprise to them as to any. Last week the Review quoted from the Secretary's Denison relatives that it was probable that he would go to Seattle, and the next day came the news of the New York acceptance. It is said that Mr. Shaw had a dislike to announcing his plans in advance as he has found that when he did they were apt to miscarry. The Carnegie Trust Company was organized in January and has a capital of one million dollars. It is a fiduciary institution and it is surmised that at the death of the great library giver this will be the agency which will administer his vast estate. Secretary Shaw's world wide fame as a financier will undoubtedly draw to the institution a vast amount of business.

It is said that the salary to be paid the president will be not less than \$50,000 per annum.

This princely salary, as large as that received by the President of the United States will doubtless be but a portion of the earning capacity of the Ex-Secretary, as opportunities for investment under the most favorable circumstances will undoubtedly offer themselves. It is understood that Mr. Shaw will not give up his Denison residence and all will be glad to know that he has lost none of his love for the old home. The position in New York will also make no change in the plans for the re-organization of the Bank of Denison which have been in contemplation for some time. Just what these changes will be has not been announced. We believe Mr. Shaw will continue both in private and in public life, to be a large factor in the affairs of the nation. His clear brain will be in evidence whether in the cabinet or in the affairs of "high finance". The people all over the country have the greatest confidence in him as a thoroughly sane product of the west. A cool-headed, careful, constructive statesman and financier. We would still advise our people to keep an eye on Shaw.

The following is the statement which he gave to the press at the time of the acceptance of the New York position.

"A man by taking thought may make himself justice of the peace, but no man in my time by taking thought has made himself president of the United States, and those who have given the subject most serious consideration have usually died in disappointment. Admittedly some of the successful ones have sought the place, but none was nominated because he sought it. Neither Lincoln, Grant, Hayes, Garfield, Blaine, McKinley, Roosevelt nor Bryan was nominated because of the state he represented, and some of them secured the prize notwithstanding location. Cleveland, Harrison, Parker and possibly one or two other defeated candidates, have been aided by location, though Mr. Cleveland was once nominated in the face of an opposing delegation from his own state.

"All but two of the men whose names I have mentioned were nominated because of what they were and for what they stood, and the two exceptions were compromises.

His Honors Came Unsought.

"Gen. Grant expressed the correct attitude of an ideal American citizen when he said he had never sought a place of honor or preferment and had never declined one. The honors that have come to me have been unsought. When the alternative of seeking the nomination for governor of my state or running away from it was presented I simply took the affirmative of the issue. Whatever Shaw presidential sentiment now exists has sprung up spontaneously, and unless it continues to grow in the same way my name will never be mentioned in a national convention. Meantime I will not decline appropriate tasks nor refuse to do my share of the world's work.

No Desertion in Iowa.

"I have ever held in contempt the man how gets a divorce from his wife as soon as fortuitous circumstances work his elevation, and I have never admired the one who divorces himself from his little home town as soon as his horizon expands. Denison, Iowa, has been my home for thirty years. While governor of the state and domiciled in Des Moines, and while hold-

ing my present position and domiciled in Washington I have always registered from Denison, Iowa, and I have written the word 'Iowa' in full with a bold and affectionate hand.

"For a time my place of business will be New York City; my domicile will probably be some convenient suburb—preferably in Connecticut—but my home will be Denison, Iowa. There will I vote, there will I spend my remnant of days if I live past retirement, and there will I be buried.

A Creature of Circumstances.

"I have ever been the creature of circumstances. The path I have followed from the farm on the side of Green mountain to the secretaryship of the treasury has opened before me only a step at a time, and I have had little to do with its meanderings. I have simply performed the tasks that circumstances have assigned. My clients have come unasked, and the other lines of business which I have pursued have suggested themselves unbidden. The place I have accepted was not sought, though it is very desirable. A well established business might mean a larger harvest, but it would be from another man's planting.

"I recognize that retirement to private life is usually acquiesced in without protest, and should no one now object it will neither annoy nor lead to political estrangement. During all the years of my manhood I have taken a more or less active part in political campaigns, though I have never sought to dominate a caucus or control a convention. My interest in the political welfare of our common country will not weaken, though the opportunity to participate in campaigns of education to as great an extent as formerly may be wanting.

Ready For Politics When Called.

"I have been told that the time is past when a new financial institution can be made to assume even moderate proportions in the city of New York without alliances with existing active business interests. The Carnegie Trust company will have no clients but its customers, no interests to serve but those of its clients, and continued health, plus the necessary time, will alone demonstrate whether ultimately I will be compelled to write the word 'defeat,' and it will be for my party to determine whether I am again invited from congenial folds of personal endeavor to the perplexities of public service."

New York Herald's Comment

The New York Herald, which shared with The Sioux City Journal the honor of first publishing this news today, said regarding Mr. Shaw's service:

It was predicted by Wall street bankers at the time of Secretary Shaw's appointment that since Mr. Shaw was a country banker he would soon come to grief as the secretary of the treasury. It is admitted now by most of these that Mr. Shaw has far more than held his own. In the face of repeated predictions of financial trouble he has met every emergency, sometimes by novel methods, but every time the predicted panic did not come to pass.

Be it resolved, by the city council of the city of Denison, Iowa, that it is deemed advisable and necessary to make improvements by laying a sanitary sewer eight inches in diameter inside, said sewer to be constructed of eight inch vitrified sewer pipe and to be laid and constructed in accordance with specifications furnished by the city engineer and approved by the city council of the city of Denison, Iowa, upon the following named Streets and parts of streets, to-wit: Washington Avenue, beginning at the intersection of Washington Avenue and East Prospect Street and running south, on Washington Avenue to a point directly opposite the Alley running East and West through Block 138 and 139, to connect with a sewer owned by the Independent School District of Denison, Iowa, on Washington Avenue.

All the expense of making said improvement to be charged to the property abutting thereon and adjacent thereto to a distance of 150 feet, in accordance with the law governing the same and the contractor who shall make said improvement shall keep the same in repair for one year from the date of its acceptance by the city.

Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Denison, Iowa: That it is deemed advisable and necessary to make improvements by laying a sanitary sewer of eight (8) inch vitrified sewer pipe, to be laid in accordance with specifications furnished by the City Engineer and approved by the City Council of the City of Denison, Iowa, upon the following named streets and parts of streets, to-wit:

On Anthony street, beginning at the intersection of Anthony street and Broadway and running south on Anthony street, two blocks to the intersection of Anthony street and Walnut street, thence east one block on Walnut street to the intersection of Walnut and Dyer streets, thence south two blocks on Dyer street to the intersection of Dyer street and Itai road avenue, thence east one block on Railroad avenue to the intersection of Railroad avenue and Main street to connect with the public sewer at that place.

All expense of making said improvement to be charged to the property abutting thereon and property adjacent thereto to a distance of one hundred fifty (150) feet from said street line, in accordance with the law governing the same. And the contractor who shall make said improvement shall keep the same in repair for one year from the date of its acceptance by the said city.
