

OBITUARY.

Denison people all sympathize deeply with John L. Richardson in his deep grief over the death of his sister. Mr. Richardson went last week to Blairtown where he attended the funeral service. At our request he has furnished us with the following obituary notice:

Mrs. Jane Richardson Troutman was born in the village of Cassadaga in western New York on the 14th of March 1832 and died on the 20th of Feb'y. 1907 near Blairtown, Iowa lacking a few days of 75 years of age. When 12 years of age she, with her parents, moved from New York to Ohio. In 1852 she was united in marriage to Samuel Whiting, a first cousin of Abraham Lincoln. The young couple soon migrated westward and settled in Linn county, Iowa. When the Civil war broke out Mr. Whiting bid adieu to wife, babies and home, shouldered his gun and marched away with the boys never to return. After a short service of fifteen months, he was stricken with disease and died. Three children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Whiting: Mrs. Irene Herl, Mrs. Alice Carver and Mrs. Jennie Baker all residing near Correctionville, Iowa. In 1877 she was married to Daniel Troutman, since which time she has resided with her husband on the farm owned by him, a few miles from Blairtown. At a very early age Mrs. Troutman became a Christian and all through her life, in joy or sorrow, in shadow or sunshine she has been the same devoted, self-sacrificing Christian woman, always more mindful and thoughtful of others than of self. No purer mortal ever graced this dark world, no kindlier light among the children of men ever shown on life's pathway.

Her husband who survives her, three children, a brother, four sisters, three step children, grand children, a host of relatives and friends rise up and call her blessed. She was laid to rest by the side of her first husband in the cemetery at Blairtown Iowa.
