

OPERA HOUSE SOLD.

Germania Verein Accepts Offer of Business Men.

THE DEED IS AUTHORIZED.

By a Large Vote Verein Endorses Sale. New Opera House Now in Sight.

Nothing but the completion of the details now stands in the way of rapid progress being made for the erection of a new opera house. At its regular meeting on Wednesday night the members authorized the sale of the building and lot. This was done by the decisive vote of 24 to 15. Of the forty-nine members all but ten were present either in person or by proxy. As several of those not voting are known to be in favor of the project, there can be no doubt but that the action voices the real sentiment of a large majority of the members. There was some objection as will be noted by the vote. Some thought the price insufficient, others wished a guarantee that the new building would be erected on the site of the old one, while still others clung with fondness to the old organization to which they had belonged for so many years. It is creditable to the Verein, however, that the spirit of loyalty to Denison and its progress won the day.

It is a fact that the members of the Verein are making a sacrifice for the good of Denison. The opera house is now a paying institution. Within two years the indebtedness could have been fully paid, and should no other opera house be erected, it is fair to presume that the income would increase rather than decrease. The members realized however that they were not giving Denison the facilities to which it is entitled. They did not feel like building a suitable opera house themselves, and they did not wish to stand in the way of others.

It is hoped that the preliminaries will be transacted as quickly as possible. The time to build an opera house is in the summer when the theatre season is practically closed. More time can be saved now than later on. The directors of the Improvement Company should act at once, not next week, but this week. Plans should be received as soon as possible and the contract should be let by the first of May. If this is done the new building can be ready for occupancy by November. Building delays often cannot be well avoided but delays in getting things started, can be avoided. The directors should meet this week, complete the arrangements for the transfer of the property and advertise for plans for the new building.
