BOX RENTS AGAIN.
 The postmaster requests the editor to call attention to the fact that box rents will be due March 21st and must be paid by April 1st. The postmaster is no more allowed to do a credit business in box rents than he is in stamps and the department rule is mandatory that boxes shall be declared vacant unless the rent is paid by the first.
 The much mooted question of the price of box rents has been finally settled by the department. All the rents are to remain as before, except in the case of the small lock boxes which are raised from forty of forty-five cents per quarter. This is but a small advance and only puts the rents paid in Denison on a par with those paid in the other cities of the same size throughout the United States. Under the circumstances therefore it is to be presumed that Denison people will acquiesce in the advance rather than to forego the privilege of a lock box. The ruling by which the lobby of the postoffice is kept open on Sunday makes these boxes particularly convenient. The postmaster asks the cooperation of the public in the prompt settlement of these rent accounts.
