TEACHERS MEET

(Continued from Page One.)

Affairs was taken care of by Professor Van Ness, when the meeting adjourned to August 11th, 1907.

The consensus of opinion of the teachers was that this meeting must prove very instructive to those who really wish to progress, while the presence of seven school directors shows a slight awakening on the part of school officers.

The Resolutions.

Resolutions passed by the teachers of Crawford County assembled in annual convention, March 15th, 1907, at Denison Crawford County, Iowa.

Whereas—There were in Crawford County two schools closed during the winter term because of shortage of teachers and the quitting of 25 teachers this spring foretells shortage of from 15 to 25 to fill the schools for the spring term, and a goodly number signifying their intention of quitting this summer foretells even a greater shortage for next year.

And Whereas—There are in Crawford County at the present time seven schools vacant for want of pupils, nine whose average attendance is less than five and fifty-nine whose average attendance is less than ten, therefore be it resolved.

First, that, since we believe the shortage of teachers to be a result of a combination of causes chief among which are, first, low wages paid to teachers as compared to all other professions of equal or inferior rank.

Second—Lack of accommodations in regard to board etc., and the neglect of proper courtesies to the teachers in many districts—a general raising of wages and a more considerate treatment of teachers is the only effective and permanent means of remedying this shortage of teachers.

Third, that, questioning the wisdom and economy of maintaining schools where the enrollment is less than ten, we recommend the temporary closing of all such schools transporting the pupils where necessary to the neighboring schools, and raising the teachers salaries so that \$45 for first, \$40 for second and \$38 for third, shall be the lowest wages received by all rural teachers in Crawford County.

Fourth—That, we shall recommend a nine month school or eight months with the same annual salary as for nine month year.

Fifth—That, the teachers be allowed the same holidays as the Government employees.

And, be it further resolved that we as teachers and educators cooperate in every possible way with the school officers of Crawford county in putting the above recommendations into early and successful operation.

Signed by the teachers special committee and approved by the teachers assembled at Denison, Iowa, March 16th, 1907.
