Mr. Meyers will make his new residence at Denison, Iowa, where he will become a member of the editorial staff of the Denison Review, edited by his brother, F. W. Meyers. The Denison Review is one of the best known papers in southwestern Iowa. Politically, it is a strong factor in not only that part of the state, but everywhere, as well as a strong publication with the interests of that immediate vicinity it has no equal in the community.

Mr. Meyers has become one of the best known figures in Cerro Gordo county through his connection with the Republican. He came here 14 years ago from Denison and purchased the Republican plant at that time and continued to publish the paper, until he sold his interests to the Stanberys last fall. Since that time he has been connected with the news end. He will be missed in Mason City very particularly through his connection with the Congregational church, of which he has been a faithful member and for the interests of which he has worked very hard.—Mason City Times Herald.
