Beside his four sons and devoted wife he has four daughter-in-laws and twelve grandchildren and a very large circle of friends to mourn his departure. He was an industrious and hard working man, quiet and honest and of a cheerful disposition, a good and helpful neighbor, a most kind and devoted husband and father. When the final summons came he was ready to go and meet his God and receive his reward and to enjoy the heavenly bliss and glory which he had hoped for. The funeral services were held on Sunday afternoon from the Baptist church of which he was a member conducted by the pastor Rev. J. Soderstrom and Rev. A. Berglund of the Baptist church in Ida county. The church was thronged by neighbors and friends. After the service was over at the church and a last look was cast on the remains of the silent husband, father, friend and neighbor his remains were followed to the Kiron cemetery and laid away to rest until that great day when those who sleep in their graves shall hear the trumpet sound of the Savior and come forth for their appointed portion.
