

THE REVIVAL MEETING

With Good Singing and Enthusiasm are Progressing.

CONNER PROVING A POWER

The Presbyterian Church Filled Nightly and Great Results are Expected.

The revival meetings at the Presbyterian church began last Sunday with splendid audiences. In the morning Mr. Conner struck the keynote of the meetings, preaching from the text, "I determined not to know anything among you, save Jesus Christ, and him crucified." His preaching has the true evangelical ring. An offering amounting to over a hundred dollars was taken at the morning service to cover the contingent expenses of the meeting, no more collections will be asked for except the usual Sabbath offerings, Mr. Conner receiving his remuneration by a free-will offering at the close of the meetings.

In the afternoon Mr. Conner gave a heart to heart talk on "Seeing Jesus." His afternoon talks promise to be one of the great features of the meeting. They will largely be in the line of Bible readings, illustrated by black-board diagrams. Many people who do not know how to get the most good out of their Bibles will be helped by these studies, as well as all Bible students. These meetings begin promptly at 3:00, and close promptly at 4:00 P. M.

Sunday night the church was packed, every available seat being taken. The text was "As Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of Man be lifted up."

One of the most attractive features of the meetings is the singing, conducted by Mr. David Sharp. A fine choir of forty voices has been organized, and contains some of our best Denison singers, members of other church choirs very kindly lending their aid. The songs are popular, and are sung with a vim. One of the favorites is "The Glory Song", so popular in the Torrey meetings in England. Too much praise cannot be given Mr. Sharp's solo work. On

Sunday morning he sang the old-time favorite, "The ninety-and-nine," in the afternoon, "My Lord and I," and at night, "Say Yes to Jesus today." He has a fine baritone voice and sings with great accuracy as well as expression. He has a very pleasing personality, and is proving an excellent choral leader.

Mr. Conner is a man who inspires confidence at first sight. His fine open face, and genial manner at once draws one to him. You feel that he is entirely sincere and thoroughly in earnest about the message that he brings.

The Presbyterian church is to be congratulated upon securing two such capable, sincere men for the meetings. To accommodate the large choir, a piano has been put in the church, and an additional platform erected for the speaker. The attendance at the Monday meetings was exceptionally large, and will doubtless increase nightly. No time is set for the close of the meetings. Services will be held every day but Saturday. The Methodist bell is being used and is rung a half-hour before each service, no second bell is rung.

Rev. Lacey and some of his people from Manilla are coming over during the meetings, and if they come so far the people living near should be on hand at every session possible if they mean business in this revival effort. The residents of the county are especially asked to come to these meetings. Mr. Conner has a great reputation as a preacher and the chance to hear such as he does not come every week to Denison.

VOSS PARTY IN WRECK

Train Plunges Through Open Switch in Arizona

VOSS IS PAINFULLY BRUISED

Remainder of Party Escape With Slight Injuries Ran Into Two Carloads of Mules.

The Voss party was in a wreck on the Santa Fe line on Monday of last week. They left the Grand Canyon in the morning and were speeding on their way towards Los Angeles, when about four o'clock in the afternoon the train dashed through an open switch and completely demolished five cars of freight standing on the siding. Two cars were loaded with mules and the havoc was something fearful. The Voss party consisting of Mr. and Mrs. Voss, Loyal Voss and Miss Ethel Gulick were in the stateroom of a Pullman sleeper. Mrs. Voss had her knee badly bruised. Loyal escaped without injury. Miss Gulick had a badly bruised elbow and Mr. Voss is said to have received the worst hurt of any person on the train. He was thrown against the lavatory in the stateroom and his left breast was severely and painfully injured. From later advices it would seem that all have now sufficiently recovered to proceed with their sight-seeing. In a letter to a friend Miss Gulick writes that the first they knew of the accident was when they were all hurled to the side of the car in an indescribable mix-up of bodies, suit-cases, valises and lunch baskets. She says that their car was on a bridge at the time and that they expected every moment that they would be thrown down the embankment. There is heartfelt gratitude among all their many friends that no worse befell them and that their lives were spared from what might have been a most painful death.
