There is no question but that the Bulletin knows news when it sees it. Ninety percent of it news last week had been previously printed in the Review. The only trouble is that the Bulletin does not have sufficient time to re-set all the news that the big Review contains.

We believe the majority of the Denison people gave with the understanding that no salaries or bonuses were to be paid and we trust that the management will adhere to this policy. Of course we are glad if good ball players find other employment here and are willing to enter our team for the sport of it, but if it becomes simply a question of which town could afford to hire the most professionals all local pride is taken out of the sport.

May 19, Isreal Enslaved in Egypt, Exodus 1, 1-14.

The lessons continue a history of the Children of Isreal in Egypt. On the invitation of Joseph and Pharaoh the Jews had come into Egypt and had been given the most fertile of the land for the feeding of their flocks and herds. Time has passed by, and the strangers have grown to be a most numerous people, and in the meantime Joseph has died and his services forgotten by the new ruler of the country. The growth of the foreign element, of different religious belief alarmed the ruler and he thought it the part of wisdom to begin such oppressive measures as would either cause the Jews to leave the country, slacken their increase in growth, or take away their power to be a menace to the nation in times of war. He therefore began a system of enslavement of the Jews, and when light servitude did not crush them he took more oppressive measures, making their labors harder, and finally tried to cripple the captives by ordering that the children should be killed at birth.

The question comes most naturally why the Jews were treated in this way when they were the chosen people of God and under His direct guidance. There is every evidence to show that the Jews were lapsing into idolatry, that they were fast worshipping the gods of the heathens about them. It will be remembered that even after a most miraculous deliverance from Egypt at the Red Sea, they demanded a golden calf to worship and longed for the "flesh pots of Egypt". To have been left in ease and contentment in Egypt would have wiped out from the history of the Jews the names of Moses, Joshua, David, Solomon, Samuel, Elijah and the remarkable groups of Old Testament characters. The entire history of the Jews had one design, in being an example for the future generations to profit by. This is declared in the New Testament by—

It is but calling attention to what we see about us daily that great results come from hard work, privations, suffering, self denial, and that ease, luxury, self-satisfaction are not incentives to great things. It seemed necessary for the Jews to go through a period of oppression to drive them closer to the one true God, to make them a distinct, peculiar people, fitted to be the instrument for preserving to the world the great, true religion of the invisible Jehovah which in time produced the civilization which made possible the country in which we now live. For we of to-day are indebted to those Jews back in Egypt for much which we as a people enjoy.
