## Proposals for Construction of Sanitary Sewers.

To Whom It May Concern: The City Council of the city of Denison, Iowa, will receive bids for the construction of a line of sanitary sewer, commencing at the intersection of Anthony street and Broadway and running south two blocks on Anthony street to the intersection of Anthony and Walnut streets, thence east one block on Walnut Street to the intersection of Walnut and Dyer streets, thence south two blocks, on Dyer street to the intersection of Dyer street and Railroad avenue, thence east one block on Railroad avenue to the public sewer on Main street, comprising in all 2565 feet, including not to exceed 60 "Y" joints and 6 "Man Holes." Said sewer to be constructed of

eight-inch vitrified sewer pipe and laid in accordance with specifications now on file in the office of the City engineer. All bids to be accompanied with a sample "joint" of the pipe upon which the bid is made. The said work shall be completed not later than the first day of October A. D. 1907. The said work to be paid for when completed and accepted by the City Council, and the successful bidder agrees to accept sewer certificates in payment of said work. Council will meet on the 23d day of May, A. D. 1907, for the purpose of opening said proposals. All bids must be filed in the office of the City Clerk not later than 7 o'clock on the 23d day of May, A. D. 1907. All bids must be in a separate envelope marked "Proposal" and shall be accompanied by a certified check of 10 per cent of the amount of the bid, payable to the City Treasurer as security that the successful bidder will enter into a contract for the construction of said sewer, also said contractor shall give such bond as is prescribed by the City Council for the faithful performance of said contract; also bond shall be conditioned that the contractor shall keep the said sewer in repair for one year from the date of its acceptance by the city. In case the successful bidder shall fail to enter into contract or to furnish bond as required by law, said check shall be forfeited to the city of Denison, Iowa, as agreed and litigated damages. The right is reserved to reject any and all bids.
