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MEMORIAL DAY 1907

A Day Marked With Notable Event

ADDRESS BY CHAPLAIN COLE

Veteran Scaggs Falls While Attending Exercises and Dies at His Home

Memorial Day 1907 will long stand out in memory from the list of the many which have been observed in Denison in the last thirty years. This for two reasons, the death of the old soldier Harry Scaggs, and the remarkable address of Chaplain Jesse Cole of the Soldiers Home at Marshalltown. So long as the memory and patriotic spirit of W. A. McHenry, Past State Commander of the G. A. R. and of Mrs. Georgia Wade McClellan the devoted worker of the Womens Relief Corps are felt in Denison, so long will Memorial Day be remembered in more than a formal way in our midst. It is to be hoped that they will be with us for many years, but it is known that their mantle will fall on soldiers able and willing to do the utmost to keep the fire burning on the altar of patriotism.

While in other towns of the state pouring rain interfered with the out of door exercises of the day, at Denison the forenoon, while cloudy allowed all who wished to attend in comfort the beautiful and solemn ceremonies which took place at the cemetery on the hill side to the south. By 9:30 the procession was ready to move from the McHenry bank corner, with that battle tried veteran J. L. McClellan marshal of the day. It will seem strange when he can no longer lead the way and take part in the ceremonies. The band was in place and playing its best music, then came a groupe of the Sons of Veterans with guns at carry to be used in firing the salute to the dead, followed by the white hearse carrying the flowers, the Union veterans, ladies of the Relief Corps and citizens in carriages and on foot. At the foot of the hill just before reaching the sacred enclosure, the conveyance having many G. A. R. men stopped and these descended to the ground and continued the march to the cemetery

KILLED INSTANTLY

Section Man on Illinois' Central Killed While at Work.

CLAUS FRAHM OF BOYER.

Death Comes From Blow Back of the Right Ear.

On Tuesday at three P. M. the section force on the Illinois Central under the boss Scott Seeley was at work putting in new ties near the Newcom siding some three miles north of Deloit. In the force was Claus Frahm and his son William. The track had been raised with the jack used on the railroad for that purpose and Claus Frahm attempted to lower it in line of duty. In some way the jack did not work right, and the long handle flew up striking the man back of the right ear killing him. He fell dead before his son and fellow workmen. The body was brought to Denison on the way freight accompanied by the son and Harry Doral one of the men. Mr. Frahm was for ten years a farmer of Stockholm township, but two years ago sold the place and moved to Boyer and began working on the section. He leaves a wife and seven children, the oldest William aged 23 and the youngest 5 years old. The sorrowing wife came by train from Boyer that evening. The Bartcher Bros. firm took the body in charge. Burial will be made from the Stockholm Lutheran church on Thursday. He was a reliable German citizen. This is a terrible thing for the wife and the seven children.
