The National Stamping Act

Which takes effect June 30, 1907, is aimed directly at the jewelry business, and while it may cover other articles, it is jewelry in which we are most interested. This act which provides that jewelry must be within two-fifths of a karat of what it is marked or stamped (i.e.) A ring or any article of jewelry stamped 14-K or even better, must be thought 13.3-K gold, it may be 14-K or even better, but not less than 13.3-K. Taking 24-K as a standard of purity, if your ring is stamped 14-K it is slightly over one-half pure gold—providing it was manufactured before June 30, 1907. The habit of many jewelers of buying 10-K goods and stamping them 14-K or 18-K, or of having one stamp and using that on all qualities, has placed on the market a great number of articles of jewelry that will black or stain the flesh when worn. While all gold, regardless of quality, will stain pure white, such as linen, silk or other white goods, it is only the alloy that stains the flesh. It is also a fact that the condition of the blood of a person will permit of some persons wearing a much lower quality than others. But with this stamping act in force, you will be assured of quality so stamped, providing such articles be bought of a responsible firm. And it is of such that you should buy. Look well to the marking of all jewelry, both as to the Karat mark and also the firm mark who manufactured it. While it cannot be expected that you are to become familiar with all trade marks in the jewelry manufacture, you should trade with the firms that can prove to you they are posted and up to date and in whom you have confidence, that you may know the article is what you pay for. You will find most jewelry marked as follows, and should help all to familiarize themselves with same: 18-K, 14-K, 12-K, which must assay 17.3-K, 13.3-K or 11.3-K fine. Where the quality is below 12-K it is usually stamped Solid Gold. In this mark you have no assurance of quality, but are assured of same quality throughout, which may be from 4 to 24-K, usually about 6 to 8-K article stamped as above followed by F. or P. we say Gold Filled or Gold Plate, insures you only of what you see, being the quality stamped. It may be thick enough to wear for 29 or 30 years or for only a week. On this stamp you must depend on your jeweler or of whom you buy, as a guarantee that you are getting value received. Our guarantee to you is—we buy only reliable goods of reliable firms, and any article not giving satisfaction will be replaced or cash refunded. You can have your choice.
