It was moved by Rollins and seconded by Jones that a committee be appointed by the Mayor to confer with the Crawford-County Telephone Company in regard to putting fire numbers on telephones. Motion carried. Mayor appointed Wright, Eggers and Tucker.

It was moved by Tucker and seconded by Wright that the request of P. J. Portz and others be granted that the City furnish pipe for water from Walnut street south on Jefferson avenue to the front of their lot line, they to do all digging and make all connections and pipe to remain the property of the city. Vote resulted as follows: Jones, no; Wright, yes; Rollins, yes; Tucker, yes; Eggers, yes. Motion carried.
