## WEATHER CROP BULLETIN.

The average temperature of the week was slightly below the normal. Showery weather prevailed from Tuesday to Friday, but the rainfall was generally much less than in the preceding two weeks. The heaviest showers occurred in the north central district. The week closed with fair weather, and as a whole it was favorable for the growing crops in the largest part of the state. Except on low, wet ground the corn crop has made very rapid advancement, having generally reached the tasseling stage. On well-drained and thoroughly cultivated lands it gives promise of a fair yield under normal conditions in the balance of the season. Work in the harvest fields has been resumed where ever the soil is sufficiently dry. Reports indicate that considerable hay has been damaged, and in some localities small grain in shock has suffered material loss. There are numerous reports of rust in oats and spring wheat which will possibly impair the quality of the grain. With better weather for the harvest in the future, the final output is likely to exceed present expectation.
