## A FINE CHAUTAUQUA.

A Brilliant and Entertaining Program.

### THREE GREAT DAYS YET

Fine Music, Entertaining Pictures and Strong Lectures.

The Denison Chautauqua is now in full blast. The great tent which will hold 1300 people is in position in Washington park in the east part of town and the attendance thus far shows that more room will be needed before the close. The management has provided comfortable seats, and all details are perfected for the convenience of the people. There is every promise that the gathering will exceed the hopes of the promoters.

The Chautauqua was formally opened on Tuesday afternoon with Mr. Graham of the Redpath bureau in charge. The prayer was made by Rev. Thuresson, after which Hon. J. P. Conner gave a brief address of welcome. He congratulated the people of Denison and vicinity on the coming of the assembly and hoped this was but the first of many to follow. He paid a fitting compliment to Miss Davis who had presented the possibilities of the program so well that the business men were ready to undertake the signing of a contract.

On Tuesday afternoon and evening the Hesperian Male Quartette made a decided hit with their singing. They are certainly good entertainers. One of the members of the quartette Mr. Thompson gave a strong lecture that afternoon on "Common People." In the evening after the Hesperians were through, Mr. Goss with his moving pictures held the people for over an hour. Some of the sets of pictures were fine indeed. The people were much taken with the views of Cindirilla going to the ball, and the girls from the boarding school out for a sleigh ride.

On Wednesday forenoon William Rainy Bennet gave a bright lecture on "The Man Who Can" and in the afternoon the Hesperians opened the program with some fine music. The great lecture by Rt. Monsignore J. Henry Tihen on this afternoon was one of the treats of the Chautauqua.

He gave his famous lecture on "Footprints on the Sands To-day." He was introduced by Father Farrelly of this city.

Judge Lindsey of Denver will not speak until Saturday afternoon. He was billed for Thursday but telegraphed he could not reach Denison for that date. The management was glad he did not say he could not come at all. In his place on Thursday afternoon will come the famous lecturer Geo. L. McNutt. He is the "Dinner Pail Man." He went out among the laboring men as one of them and gained many rich experiences which he is able to tell about in a most instructive and entertaining manner. The Royal Hungarian Orchestra appears on Thursday and Friday.

Governor Hoch on Friday, Judge Lindsey on Saturday, Congressman Bede on Sunday. What an array of great talent. Then on Sunday morning one of the ablest Methodist ministers of the West will give the sermon, Rev. Daniel McGurk of Kansas City. It is said that his people are building a million dollar church for him to preach in.



Two Well Known Germans Return From a Three Months Visit

"There is no place like home" declare John Ehler and Wm. Koepke, two well known Germans who returned this week from a trip of nearly four months in Germany. Mr. Ehler and wife and three children went from Schleswig and Mr. Koepke and wife from Denison. Mr. Ehler is particularly enthusiastic in lauding the greatness of America over Germany. They of course visited in Schleswig-Holstein among relatives who did their best to make their stay enjoyable. They were in the heart of the great black forests, saw the

Rhine, were at Kiel and many of the noted cities of the Fatherland. The slow going customs of the people did not suit such active progressive Americans as the men from Iowa. They did not fail to sound the praises of the United States. Mrs. Ehler is the daughter of Henry Suckstorf now of Schleswig. She was born in this country. The German relatives were at a loss to know what they would do with a visitor who did not talk the German language, before they met her. To their surprise both she and three children could talk as good English as the natives. If you want to see two men well satisfied with Iowa and the western part in particular get to talking with Ehler and Koepke.

### BATESON TO MILWAUKEE

Former Denison Pastor Accepts Important Charge

Rev. Frederick W. Bateson, pastor of the First Baptist church of this city, has received a call from the Tabernacle Baptist church in Milwaukee, the largest Baptist church in that city, and must make his decision by next Sunday, at which time he will announce it to his congregation here.
