floor of his house was flooded and the family was obliged to spend the night up stairs. Mrs. Welsh is still seriously ill as a result of cold and exposure. Mr. Welch places his loss at not less than \$500. A new piano was badly injured and household furniture was ruined.

Ralph Jackson estimates his loss at \$300. His house was right in the current and got the full effect of the flood. The house was partially wrecked, all household goods destroyed and a fine garden a total loss.

The family of M. Flahive was awakened by the neighbors only to find some 28 inches of water in the house. It was thought at first that the children were alone in the house and they were called by telephone, they thought the ringing was caused by the electric storm and paid no attention to it. They finally made their escape to the Messenbrink home where so many took refuge. The loss here was \$150.

Mrs. Dan McCarthy and daughters were awakened by neighbors when the water was almost up to the top of the beds. They knew nothing of the flood and in response to the call they jumped out of bed into a foot and a half of cold water. They finally made their way through the flood to the Messenbrink home. Their loss is estimated at \$450. They lost household goods, furniture, books and some seventy chickens.

Jos. Habel and family were also driven to the Messenbrink home. The depth of the water in their house was 29 inches deep.

The house of Mrs. Mary Messenbrink was the rendezvous for the flooded-out neighbors. There was three feet of water in the house but it is a large two story structure and the neighbors found it a safe haven from the waves. Mrs. Messenbrink lost in damage to household goods, canned goods broken and chickens drowned.

The home of John Flahive was filled with three feet of water. Household goods, clothing, thirty-five quarts of canned fruit and 25 chickens were among the losses which amounted to \$300. John went home about eleven o'clock but did not think then that there was danger of a flood. Later he was awakened and did good service in helping the other flood victims.

Frank Messenbrink suffered a loss of \$150. Over one hundred of his chickens were drowned. He took refuge at the home of Mrs. Mary Messenbrink, the two story structure shown in the illustration.

Aside from the damage to individuals the loss to the county in bridges and culverts was large, undoubtedly amounting to several thousand dollars.

Mrs. Ben Hoffard and daughter, Kate returned Sunday from Moorhead where they visited friends for a week.

Bert Stevers reports that he was among the flood victims. He says this is the first time he has been injured by water.
