## THE BIG TRIAL

After Three Strenuous Days a Jury is Secured.

## HASSANS ARE ON THEIR TRIAL

Opening Statements in County's First Murder Trial Made To Day.

After three strenuous days a jury has been secured in the case of the State vs Joseph and Solomon Hassan, accused of the murder of Fred Nafal on January, 5th 1907.

Fifty seven men were examined before the twelve were secured before whom the case is to be submitted. It is a peculiar fact that there is neither a German or an Irishman on the jury. The jurors are as follows:

Judge Powers is the presiding judge in this important trial. County Attorney P. J. Klinker is assisted by Mr. Jacob Sims in the prosecution. Conner and Lally have charge of the defense and have associated with them Ex-Judge Slabaugh of Omaha, the man who, as county attorney of Douglas county, Nebraska had charge of the prosecution of the noted Pat Crowe. As soon as the jury was secured, Mr. Klinker opened for the state.

He told what the state expected to prove by its witnesses, and his speech foreshadowed some testimony not submitted at the preliminary hearings. His speech was brief and it was evident that he did not care to show his hand even at this time. Mr. Lally opened for the defense. He also was reserved in his statements. He dwelt upon the friendly relations existing between Nafal and the Hassans, but he refrained from anything which might be considered as an outline of the defense.

### Testimony is Taken.

After a brief recess the State commenced the introduction of testimony. It is too late for any synopsis of the evidence in this issue, but next week

## DEATH'S CALL

Mrs. Otto an Aged German Woman Responds

On Sunday morning occurred the death of Mrs. Chris Otto, Sr. at the home of her son Wm. in East Denison.

Christine Elisabeth Otto, nee Gottlieb, was born April, 15th 1836 in Bremen, Germany. She was married to Chas. Otto in 1861. Their union was blessed with fourteen children, of which five survive the mother, namely, Henry, residing in Minnesota, Mrs. Willhemine Nissen of Stockholm township, Chris, Mrs. Frieda Luft, and William of Denison. In 1885 the family came to America, locating in Crawford county, where they have lived ever since. Besides the husband, three sisters and three brothers, and a number of grandchildren mourn the sudden death of a dear wife, sister, mother and grandmother.

## FARMER DISAPPEARED

Hans Stubbe of Jackson Suddenly Drops From Sight.

## NO TRACE IS DISCOVERED

Country is Scoured but Missing Man Not Found

On Wednesday, Sept. 11th Harm Stubbe a middle aged German farmer of Jackson township, suddenly dropped out of the knowledge of men. The proverbial needle in the hay stack was not lost more completely than he has been for the past week.

Mr. Stubbe bought a bunch of cattle of S. Newcom, last week. He sold them at Vail and went with his son to the Newcom place to drive the cattle to Vail. He left his horse and buggy at Mr. Hans Wulf's place, going on foot to help get the cattle started, when he was to return and drive to Vail with Mr. Wulf. He started from the Wulf farm, and he has not been seen since.

He was missed before many hours and searching parties were organized. As he was on foot, it did not seem possible that he could have gone far. He had no considerable sum of money with him. He had paid Mr. Newcom for his cattle and had not received the money for them at Vail. He had not been in good health and sudden death from heart failure is feared, or else that he became demented and wandered away. A man was located near Baitle Creek who was thought to answer the description, but he proved not to be the man. Last night Sheriff Meehan received word from Kenwood concerning a man who might be Stubbe and parties from Charter Oak are searching in that vicinity today. The following description is from a post card issued by Mrs. Mary Stubbe, wife of the missing man, any one knowing anything as to his whereabouts should communicate with Sheriff Meehan at once.

## DESCRIPTION OF HARM STUBBE

German, 50 years of age, light complexion, slender, height 5 feet 10 inches, weight 145 pounds, wears a moustache, hair short, eyes blue-gray. Speaks broken English, heavy smoker, uses straight shank briar pipe. Ankle stiff, shows in walk. Fingers of right hand crooked, wore soft light grey hat, work shirt, light gray pants, carried yellow bill book.

## "I WANT TO REST"

With These Words Mrs. J. M. Potter Dies at Denison

On Sunday morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Merrill, in north Denison occurred the death of Mrs. J. M. Potter. About four weeks ago Mrs. Potter went on a visit to her daughter, Mrs. Artie Lee of Sac City. During her stay there the Lee baby boy was stricken with cholera infantum, and died. This was a great shock to the loving little grandmother and she was in no condition to withstand the sickness which soon came upon her. It was thought best that she come home and so on last Monday, she returned to Denison with Mrs. Merrill. Until Saturday night she was not thought to be critically ill, but at that time a change came from which she did not rally. Death came as a messenger of peace, and her last words were: "I want to rest."

Eliza J. Torrence, was born at Fairfield, Ohio, July 27th 1833, and so had reached the age of seventy-four years. When but a young girl she came with her parents to Jones county Iowa, and there in her youth she began the faithful, devoted christian life which she has lived for so many years.

When twenty-one years old she was united in marriage to J. M. Potter, who survives her. Seven children were born to them, four of whom are living. These are Mrs. Ella Printy of Center Point, Frank, who resides at Columbia Falls, Mont. Mrs. Addie Merrill of Denison and Mrs. Artie Lee of Sac City, Mrs. Ellen Nichols of Glidden, a sister is also left to mourn the loss of this loved one.

Twenty-five years ago the Potter family came to Denison and united at once with the Baptist church, and in all these years have stood for the true and noble things of life. The funeral services were held at the home on Tuesday morning, conducted by Rev. Thuresson, who spoke briefly from the text "For me to live is Christ, to die is gain." A quartette composed of Miss Allie Sewell, Mrs. Chas. K. Meyers, Mr. L. M. Cassaday and Dr. Plimpton sang appropriate selections. The floral tributes were most beautiful, and remembrance of the pure, sweet, fragile life which had faded away to bloom again in the larger, nobler life beyond.
