BIG CROWDS ATTEND

Trial of Hassan Boys Proves Interesting.

MANY LADIES ARE PRESENT

Evidence of State Not Completed and Trial Will Last All The Week.

The trial of Joseph and Solomon Hassan on the charge of murdering Fred Nawfl is proving most interesting case ever brought before the courts of Crawford county. The court room is crowded at every session and a glance at the auditorium makes one wonder whether he is at a caucus or an afternoon tea.

To the Hassans and their father, and to the attorneys who are battling to their uttermost, the case is a very serious affair. Up to this time the state has been introducing its evidence and nothing on behalf of the defense has been heard. The legal battle is a stubborn one, every bit of testimony being the subject of controversy. Up to date the testimony follows quite closely the line of testimony given before the justice of the peace.

It is not good newspapering and it is not enterprising, but in as much as men's lives are at stake the Review thinks best not to publish details of the testimony until the case has been decided. At least fifty witnesses will be examined by the State and the number of witnesses to be called by the defense is not known.

Judge Powers is doing all he can to expedite the case. Court will convene this week at 8 a. m. and night sessions will probably be held also. It is hardly probable this case will be completed this week.

Other Court Matters

Last evening the grand jury brought in five indictments. They were all for selling liquor to minors and were against the Militarische Bruderschaft, and all the saloon keepers of Denison except T. C. McCarthy.

It is alleged that beer was sold to minors at the Bruderschaft dance last month, and that on the morning following four minors secured liquors at four of the Denison saloons. As the Bruderschaft has no license any liquor sale made by it would be illegal.

We understand that the saloon men expect to plead guilty, although they maintain that they endeavor to obey the law and that the sales were made by bartenders against the instructions of the proprietors. The saloons will doubtless be fined and they will probably be more careful in the future.

DENISON LOST OUT.

The Big Campmeeting of L. D. S. Voted to Little Sioux.

Denison did not succeed in securing the annual campmeeting of L. D. S. for next year. This was not the fault of the leaders of the project N. L. Hunt and Elder C. J. Hunt of Deloit. Those present say that Elder Hunt waxed eloquent over Denison, and what her people would do. He was allowed to speak twice. Elder Herman Smith who spoke at Denison recently presided over the meeting and said Denison treated him well, and he was favorable to it. When one considers that not over three or four of the denomination live in Denison, and few if any of them were present at the meeting, the vote was most flattering. Little Sioux was successful. The vote of the Dow City members went to Denison after the first ballot. The vote on the leading places were as follows: First ballot, Little Sioux 103, Denison 81; second ballot, Little Sioux 156, Denison 129; third ballot Little Sioux 163, Denison 143.

New System Takes Effect November 16th.

FINE FOR THE FARMERS

Several New Routes Added and Old Routes Changed.

Announcement of the long expected inauguration of county free delivery in Crawford has finally been made to take effect throughout the county on Nov. 1.

There will be a new route at Deloit and route seven will be added out of Denison. The routes throughout the county will be greatly changed and it will undoubtedly make some little confusion in the mails at first. Patrons should see that their correspondents are advised as to their new addresses as speedily as possible after the changes are made.

According to the new law carriers now receive \$90 per annum. They are given five holidays each year and each carrier is entitled to fifteen days leave with pay. The appointments are made after a civil service examination. The examination is not especially difficult being only upon such matters as a carrier would be apt to need in the discharge of his duties. Application blanks may be had at the Denison postoffice and they must be forwarded to the department not later than Oct. 9th. The examination will be held Oct. 19th. Below we give the changes which will be made in routes 2 and 3 out of Denison and the route of Number Seven the new one. The other changes out of Denison are very minor.

The Band Carnival drew but four bands to Denison and while they made excellent music there was much disappointment expressed by those who had been led to believe that something like fifteen bands were to be in attendance. The tournament attracted many people to the city and they enjoyed the music, but for the most part they refused to go into a tent and pay a quarter for what they could hear, if anything a little better on the outside. For this reason the receipts were very light and the business men who guaranteed their expenses will have to put up in the neighborhood of \$100 to make up the deficit. Dances were given on Monday and Tuesday nights and these netted something less than \$100. In some way Denison failed to appreciate the opportunity to make the carnival a big thing and it was something of a disappointment, not only to the spectators but to the musicians.

Prof. Kearney of Jefferson proved an efficient leader of the consolidated band which numbered nearly 100 pieces. He was re-elected for the coming year and Jefferson was selected as the next meeting place. 
The Balle-Broderson Opening Attracts Many Visitors.
