HABITS OF MANSFIELD

How He Discharged Employees and Forgot All About It.

FAMOUS ACTOR'S CHARITIES.

Business Associate of Great Tragedian Recalls the Many Persons He Aided and Vast Number of Christmas Checks He Sent Out—Disliked Fast Trains.

Many stories were always current about the late Richard Mansfield, the famous actor, during his lifetime, but many that were never told before were repeated recently by men who knew him and who wished to pay their tribute to his memory.

Small things would irritate him beyond all reason, and he had a way of discharging members of his company on very trivial grounds and of paying no attention usually when he saw them about afterward.

When he first appeared in the theater he had a dressing room some distance above the stage, which he had to reach by an elevator. After two or three trips above he became very much annoyed and sent an attendant to find Mr. Klaw, one of the owners.

"You are discharged. Go away and never enter the theater again. I shall inform Klaw & Erlanger tomorrow."

The man, who happened to be an employee of the Mansfield company and not of Klaw & Erlanger, obediently put on his hat and coat, went out one door, came in another, resumed work, and that ended the episode.

At the beginning of the run of "Ivan the Terrible" Mr. Mansfield would not take any curtain calls. The first night audience kept on applauding for five minutes, but he refused to appear.

Mr. Mansfield had his own railroad car, and whenever he traveled with his company he had a special train. He insisted that the speed of the train should never exceed thirty-five miles an hour, and he contracted with the railroads on that basis.

Even when he was in the shadow of death he had a special train. After landing in Montreal he was anxious to get farther south at once and asked Mr. Stevens to make the arrangements.

eral years associated with him, "was his charity and benevolence. He and the objects of his charity were the only persons who knew of it. I recall one day in Pittsburg, when the thermometer was 15 degrees below zero, he picked up a paper and read an account of a woman with four or five children who were starving.

"Mr. Mansfield was passionately fond of children and always made much of those we carried in the company with us. There was one little girl with us Christmas before last. He arranged a Christmas tree and bought her so enormous a doll that it could not be hung on a branch and had to be concealed until it was presented."

STICK FOR THE PRESIDENT.

Made of Two Kinds of Wood, Typical of Union of North and South.

Should President Roosevelt speak before the assembled ranks of the Grand Army of the Republic when they meet at Saratoga for their annual reunion he will return from the convention with a token of esteem from the veterans which will doubtless reach a tender spot in his heart, says the Washington Herald.

Colonel R. E. Whitman, who is an admirer of the president, is the originator of the idea to present Mr. Roosevelt with a "big stick" similar in shape to, but fully five times as large as, the type of souvenir cane which will be sold to the veterans on the day they gather at Saratoga.

The stick is straight, tipped with a solid silver cap and made from two piles of the historic old Long bridge, over which in 1861-65 marched a million men and which, though finally torn down Dec. 17, 1906, will live in song and story so long as the memory of the great war shall last.

The different kinds of wood used in the cane are Georgia pine and northern oak, so that the cane represents the two standard woods of the north and south, loked firmly together as one "big stick" in the possession of the president, who has done so much toward joining the ties of these two sections of this nation.

AGED TIGHT ROPE WALKER.

Woodchopper Says He is the Famous Blondin and Amazes Countrywide.

Saying he is Blondin, who walked a tight rope across Niagara falls forty years ago and who was believed to have died in London in 1892, an aged man known as Michael Todro recently walked a tight rope in Cheshire, Conn., according to a New Haven special dispatch to the New York Herald.

The village people were holding a carnival and fair for the benefit of their library. Having heard that the old man said he would give a performance, he agreed to do it in the afternoon and came to the town green prepared with a pair of tights and a long iron pipe. The wire rope was about twenty feet above the street. The man climbed up and after taking time to steady himself with the iron pipe walked the wire without difficulty.

A Monument In Prospect.

A monument is to be erected at Athens to the memory of Constantine Palaeologus, the last Byzantine emperor, who fell in defending his capital against Mahomet II, says the London Athenaeum. The competition for the design will be international, and the result will be announced at Rome. There are to be five prizes—5,000 francs, 2,000 francs and three of 1,000 francs each.
