DEATH OF DORATHEA EVERS.
Little Dorathea Evers, who was reported ill last week, died at the home of her grand parents, Henry Pahl and wife, on Saturday morning at 3:30 o'clock. She was sick about two weeks and seemed somewhat better last week until Thursday, when it was decided that an operation would be necessary. A physician from Omaha was sent for, who came Thursday evening bringing two nurses to assist him. The operation was performed that evening. The operation which was for an abscess in her side, was thought to be successful, and Friday the patient seemed to be getting along as well as could be expected, but Friday evening she grew weaker and passed quietly away Saturday morning. Her father August Evers arrived Wednesday from Wyoming having been sent for during her illness.

Everything possible for loved ones to do was done to save the little one's life, but death seemed inevitable. Dorathea Evers was born February 2, 1902, and died October 5, 1907, being 4 years and 8 months old at the time of her death. Her mother, Elizabeth Evers died February 14, 1906, since which time she has lived with her grand parents. She leaves besides her father many relatives to whom she was very dear. The sympathy of the entire community is with the bereaved ones in the loss of their loved one.
The funeral took place at the German church Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. Emil Hansen of Schleswig officiating. The floral offerings were many and very beautiful. The pall bearers were four little girls, who had been playmates of little Dorathea. Interment was made in the West Side cemetery.


TO SAVE THE CORN

Prof Holden to Save Seed Corn Now
Ames, Iowa, Oct. 1, 1907.

Dear Sir:
I was anxious to have the enclosed circular reach you before this, but we were unavoidably delayed in getting it from the printer.
The main object which I have in mind is that everybody interested shall keep hammering away during the entire month of October on the importance of harvesting at once all of the seed corn to be planted next season.
The enclosed poster is simply suggestive and you are at liberty to use the material in any way you see fit, or to quote me in any way that will aid in the matter of improving the corn in your community.
The common practice of depending

for seed on the occasional good ears secured during the entire husking season is bad and costs this State millions of dollars annually. The corn has been frozen night after night in the field during November before it is husked and while it still contains a large amount of moisture, consequently much of it is weakened or killed, giving a poor stand and weak stalks, which more than anything else reduces the yield. Iowa needs big joggng to the importance of harvesting the seed corn as early as possible in October.
Kindly do all you can to help in this important matter.


