

**CORN JUDGING DAY**

Farmers About Dow City Compete for \$5 Prize

**FRANK JACKSON THE WINNER**

An Expert From Ames College Judges Corn and Explains His System of Rating.

Mr. Fishel, the banker at Dow City is entitled to the thanks of the farmers about Dow City for his interest in corn culture to the extent of giving a premium of \$5 to the one bringing in the best ten ears by Friday, Oct. 25th. To make the award on scientific grounds he paid an expert from Ames State college to come to Dow City and be the judge. The college sent Mr. Theo. Sexauer who proved to know his business as taught by Prof. Holden at Ames.

The corn was laid out in regulation style in the bank and the expert began testing by considering general appearance, taking out kernels for inspection, noting looseness on the cob, whether cob was well filled, and size of cob. In the end he gave the preference to the ten ears presented by Frank Jackson, and his second choice was corn grown by Frank Odell.

The prize winning corn was of the "Legal Tender" variety, of moderate length of ear, kernels wide all the way down, rows straight, no white kernels, well filled on the butt of the ears. Some of the ears of Mr. Odell's corn were about perfect but the ten as a whole did not come up to others. He said he bought the seed from Funk Brothers, Bloomington, Ill., and for Reed Yellow Dent hand picked and all right. Not over fifty per cent came up, and he felt he had been cheated. He asked many questions of the expert and all farmers gained much information.

Mr. Sexauer had along a roll of charts and a sample of the seed testing box. In his talk he said among other things the following: "The United States and the part where Iowa is in particular, excels in producing corn. Other countries are ahead of us on cheese, butter, live stock, but fifty-nine per cent of the total value of the crops of the nation is corn. We therefore should look well to its culture. The farmers should raise the 'largest ears that will mature in their section.' In a judging contest the points are 1st general appearance, 2nd, trueness to type, 3rd maturity, 4th vitality and shelling per centage. The ears should be well filled at tip, center and butt. The plan should be to get the variety with the deepest kernels which will mature in your section."

The best plan for handling seed corn is to hang it up by means of strings in a place where there will be a good draft of air to aid drying. One hundred ears will make a bushel. Mr. Sexauer told of the scientific method of testing seed. The ears to be tested should be laid out in rows, two kernels taken from butt, center and tip. A box not very deep should be put in use placing some two inches of wet dust in the bottom. Over this should be placed some strong white cloth which has been marked off into squares of two inches. These squares should be numbered to correspond with the number given each ear of the corn to be tested. The six kernels from each cob should be placed on the right square with the germ side up. Another piece of strong cloth should be placed over the corn in a careful manner and then a good coating of wet saw dust. The box must be put in a warm place for seven days and then examined. Of course the ears to be tested have been kept in the original order and so when the seed in the box is examined the farmer can tell from which ears have come corn which show all the kernels have germinated, for he cannot afford to plant any corn knowingly, that will not grow.

Mr. Sexauer said, that scientifically white and yellow corn stood equal for feeding, the show ears of corn should be picked at husking time and not early; if you buy corn from abroad insist on getting it in the ear; three kernels in the hill is the best; have a number of sets of planter plates and grade the size of corn so to have the right number of kernels in a hill.

The expert showed drawing of different insects and worms which hurt or destroy the corn crop also figures showing the loss when there are many barren stalks or poor stand. Mr. Charles Buss asked him many intelligent questions. Mr. Buss said the Legal Tender did best in the Boyer valley. The expert told of breeding corn; taking off the tassels of certain rows or barren stalks and methods of raising the standard. He does not believe in sending very far away for seed corn. The group of farmers who heard the lecture were benefitted, and all seemed to appreciate the kindness of Mr. Fishel in bringing Mr. Sexauer to Dow City.

**Sunday School Column**

Side Lights on Next Sunday's Lesson for Teachers and Pupils.

Nov. 3. The Cities of Refuge Josh. 20: 1-9.

The lesson of this date calls attention to one of God's methods of teaching the Jews of old the qualities of justice and forbearance. In the ancient days of all nations and particularly those living about northern Africa and Asia Minor the custom was to give blow for blow, and eye for eye, a tooth for a tooth, to demand the death at once, if possible, of one taking the life of another. It was the mission of the bible religion to break down this feeling of blood for blood, revenge for a wrong, the taking of human life in desire to "get even" with out reference to the merits of the case. In due time when the blessed Jesus came He said to forgive your enemies, plan to do them good, win them back as friends through kindness. He taught the doctrine of love, St. Paul glorified the beauties of Love in that wonderful chapter in Corinthians where under the name of "charity" this God like quality of the heart is so masterfully set forth.

The custom of the next kin spending his life to avenge the death of father, brother, son, was so thoroughly woven in the nature of the Children of Israel that it could not be eradicated, and so a means was taken to temper with justice and mercy the custom of the times, when death had been caused without malice or intent. God directed that six cities should be set apart as "Cities of Refuge". He then provided that when one killed another through accident with no previous intent, he could fly to a city of refuge, and there find safety until the case could be heard by the proper authorities. If guilty of wilful murder, the man was handed to the person whom custom said was the one to avenge the death, but if found innocent of malice and that the death came "unwittingly" the offending one could remain unharmed in the city permanently, or until the death of the ruling High Priest.

The fact of the cities of refuge, and safety from those intent on doing one injury, is held up before us as typical of the refuge which God offers those who feel they have done wrong and desires a means of escape, a place where they can have forgiveness, pardon, a chance to show their better selves. As the man needing the help of the city of refuge, was in danger, if he did not fly, so are those who rebel against God's teachings and are going on in dissipation and sin. Delays were dangerous in the olden times, and are so now. In the Golden Text the Psalmist exclaims "My refuge is in God" and thousands after him have found this to be true. As the man flying, as helpless if he encountered his adversary, so is the man or woman in sin and rebellion against God, and if wise, he will make haste to a better life, and gain strength to hold it to, from a divine source.
