GAIN BRILLIANT VICTORY

Denison High School Boys Give Carroll a Beating at Foot Ball.
The ice has been broken and the hoodoo that has pestered the High School foot ball teams of Carroll and Denison is no more. He is buried beneath the foot ball field at Carroll. Our boys are victors and Carroll the mourners.

These two High schools met for the fourth time last Saturday within the past three years and three times the score stood 0 to 0 as the last whistle blew, but not so the fourth time. Last Saturday's game will not be forgotten by the boys who fought the battle. It was fairly played; it was hard fought and a worthy victory for the victors. The referee's whistle blew for action at 2:45 and the game was on. Carroll had won the toss and defended the west goal. Denison kicked to Carroll and it was soon evident that Carroll could not pass Denison's line of scrimmage by means of straight foot ball. The ball was carried and kicked back and forth and not till the first half was about over did Carroll finally bring the ball to Denison's fifteen yard line. Here the Denison team showed its real strength and Carroll was unable to carry the ball any farther. The first half was over and the score 0 to 0.

In the second half, Carroll kicked to Denison and now our boys demonstrated their power in carrying the ball. By short end runs and line plays, the local team carried the ball from one end of the field to the other; but Carroll braced and Denison was unable to make a touchdown. The ball was kicked back to the center of the field where Carroll recovered it. Denison again forced Carroll to kick and the ball was caught by Searl on Denison's own five yard line. Here Searl was called upon to kick the ball out of danger. The ball sailed high and it was an even chance between Bell of Carroll and Daniels of Denison for the ball. The colored player of Carroll missed and Daniels snapped the pigskin and was off on an 80 yard dash for a touch down. The game was won, but Searl added one more point by a goal kick, making it 6 to 0. Before the half was over, Vanderwall of Denison blocked the only kick that has been stopped on Carroll. The ball was recovered by Carroll on her own five yard line. Here Carroll successfully kicked it out of danger and the game was over.

For Carroll, Bell, Ross and Miner did the star work; while Searl, Daniels and Tranter did the stellar work for Denison.
