

HENRY SCHNAACK IS DEAD.

Aged German Citizen Passes to the Life Beyond.

Mr. Hans Schnaack an aged and highly respected German-American citizen of Denison died of the infirmities of age at an early hour on Tuesday, November 26th. Funeral services will be held at the German Lutheran church at two o'clock on Thursday afternoon and interment will be made in the Lutheran cemetery. Mr. Schnaack was born in Brekendorf Schleswig-Holstein, Germany, on Jan. 23, 1824. In 1851 he was married to Miss Catharine Schmidt, the loving wife who survives him.

It was not until 1882 that they came to America, and Denison was their first place of residence in this country. The deceased led a quiet, useful and industrious life and earned the respect and confidence of all who knew him. He leaves two daughters, Mrs. Henry Andersen of East Boyer township and Mrs. Hans Mangles of Holstein, Iowa. Seven grandchildren and five great grandchildren also mourn his loss.

SALE WAS SATISFACTORY.

The McHenry Sale Attracts Many Buyers and Good Prices.

The sale of Aberdeen-Angus cattle held at the McHenry farm last week attracted about 100 prominent cattle men from different parts of the country. Forty-four animals were sold. \$900 was the top price and was paid for Blackbird McHenry No. 66 a prize yearling heifer. Blackbird McHenry, a calf, sold for \$800 and Blackbird McHenry No. 46, a cow sold for \$700. No sale was made for less than \$100 and the average price was \$324. All but one of the sales were to Iowa parties. Blume Bros. of Dow City and Johnson of Kiron were the only Crawford county buyers. Mr. McHenry was much pleased with the result of the sale.

After the sale Maurice Fitzpatrick, who had been assisting with the cattle was thrown from his horse. His shoulder was badly dislocated and his foot was severely injured. He was taken to the Bauman home the following day but his injuries are of such a nature that he will be crippled for some time.

Denison Boy Appointed District Judge in Isthmian Canal Zone

Edgar S. Garrison has been appointed Judge of the District Court of the district of Empire, with headquarters at Empire, Canal Zone, with a salary of \$2400. The appointment was made by Hon. J. C. S. Blackburn, Governor of the Canal Zone, and Edgar was selected from a number of applicants, young attorneys working for the commission and members of the Canal Zone bar. He is assigned the largest and hardest district in the Zone containing Empire and Culebra the two largest towns. He will assume his new duties on Dec. 1st. Judge Garrison went to the Isthmus in August, 1905. For five months he worked in the Master Builders office and for 22 months he has been in the office of the prosecuting attorney where all his work has been of legal nature. Edgar is a young man of ability and we congratulate him upon his promotion.


FATHER SLATER GONE

A Pioneer of the Southern Part of the County Died on Sunday

MR JOHN SLATER OF MANILLA

One of the Three Men Who First Settled in South Nishnabotny Township

On Sunday, November, 24th death came peacefully to Mr. John Slater at this home in Manilla just opposite the M. E. church. Thus ended the life of one of the best and purest men who ever settled in Crawford county. It was in 1871 that three men whose names were destined to have most honorable mention in the history of the county came by team across Iowa from Wisconsin, John Slater, Henry Walker and Robert Theobald. They camped west of Denison ten days and made trips north toward Deloit and toward Dow City looking at land. Finally they heard of the beautiful Nishnabotny valley and a view of it settled the question of location. Mr. Theobald

bought land in section 33, Walker in 23 and Slater in 35. The latter, however entering as he thought government land. In that garden spot of Iowa near Manilla Mr. Slater improved his farm, raised his family and lived a life having the respect of God and man.

Mr. Slater was born in Derbyshire England November, 6, 1826, and was 81 years old this month. He came to Wisconsin when seventeen years old. He married Harriett Slagg, April, 13, 1851, and she survives him after these many years of faithful living together. He leaves five children, Fred who is the deputy postmaster at Manilla, Thomas, Mrs. Hattie Van Meter and Mrs. Elmer Kester of Manilla and Mrs. Marie Slagg of Fort Atkinson, Wis., and many grand children. His home was at Astor when that town started and later the house was moved to Manilla and there he lived and died. In the early days and at all times his home was noted for its hospitality, and many are the recollections coming to hundreds of people of shelter, a warm welcome and friendliness at his house. He busied himself doing something until the last. He acted as janitor of the M. E. church until two weeks before his death.

The funeral was held in the church on Wednesday afternoon, the services being conducted by Rev. Cable the pastor. Mr. Slater and Rev. Cable had grown to be very close to each other, and the good pastor was able to speak with a full understanding of the grand, gentle, trusting Christian life of the deceased. His loved ones mourn not as those having no hope of meeting the kind, loving, tender, father again.
