Watson in 1887, and he loaned me the Angus scrapbook that he and his father had kept; there I read the history written by McDonald and Sinclair and learned where all the best cattle and the best families were bred and shown, and

then I read the history written by Wm. McCombill of Tillifour, Scot- land, and I believe I knew the good ones then about as well as I do now. "I started with families that I would not have to change. If I de- sired to make any change in the make- up of my herd or to begin differently a second time I would not know how to do it." To have been able to hold such a sale as did Mr. McHenry, one of the best of the year, speaks volumes for the confidence the breeders have in him and the cattle he has so long bred.
