### DENISON DEFEATS MANILLA

The Thanksgiving Day Game Marks the Close of a Successful Season

The Denison High School Football Team won the last game of the season by defeating the heavy Manilla team 45 to 0 on Turkey Day. It was speed against weight, and speed won. The Denison boys played a fast, snappy game, from start to finish, and ran almost perfect interference; while on the defensive they were a stone wall.

Manilla won the toss and received the kick off at the south goal. They could not gain however, and Denison got the ball on Manilla's twenty-five yard line. Three plays took the ball over for the first touchdown, and Searl kicked goal.

Manilla kicked to Denison, and the ball was carried to the center of the field. Heiden got loose on a fake cross buck and went 50 yards before they could stop him, and a couple of line smashes took the ball over.

Denison kicked to Manilla at the south goal, but Manilla could not gain and punted. Searl carried the punt back five yards, Nicholson gained ten on a quarterback run, and

Searl carried the ball over for the third touchdown, afterwards kicking the goal. The first half ended shortly after, with the score 17 to 0 for Denison.

The play in the second half was more open, and the boys made 28 more points by the use of trick plays. Among the spectacular plays of this half were an 80 yard return of a kick off by Andy Dannels, and a 40 yard run by Ralph Tranter who got loose on a straight buck.

Every boy on the Denison team played a star game. Paul Tranter made four touchdowns. Searl made two, and Ralph Tranter made two. Even Alva Dannels who went in for the last five minutes recovered a punt and almost got loose for a touchdown. The half ended with the ball on Manilla's 15 yard line.

#### A Review of the Season

The most successful season the D. H. S. football team has held for the last five years came to close Thanksgiving Day. Denison's goal line has not been crossed during the entire season, and in only one game were they defeated; Wall Lake doing the trick by a couple of field goals. Denison's total score for the season

is 132, as against 8 points made by her opponents.
