The Iowa College Glee Club of Grinnell, an organization that has made an enviable reputation for itself during the past few years, will make its annual holiday trip this year along the line of the Northwestern railway. The club gave a concert in its infancy in Denison and would like to return now with the finished product. Mr. Fellows has taken the matter up and asks that all who are interested subscribe for tickets at Johnson's as soon as possible. The expense of an organization of twenty members is considerable and some guarantee is needed beforehand.

The Iowa College Glee Club is in no sense the makeshift organization that college glee clubs are generally held to be. It is a concrete musical company of the highest character, many of its members are singers and instrumentalists of pronounced ability and its training has always been since the first year of its organization of the most rigid and thorough type. Unlike similar organizations, the leadership of the Iowa College Glee Club does not change from year to year; on the contrary, it has had but two leaders since it was established in 1894. Both of these have been musicians of broad education and eminent qualifications for leadership, and the club today challenges comparison for rich and refined quality of tone, purity of intonation, delicacy of sentiment, versatility of expression, and that enthusiastic way of singing which holds and inspires an audience.

In addition to these qualities, which are usually considered to be beyond the reach of glee clubs, the Iowa College Glee Club possesses those elements of good fellowship and wholesome humor which are always welcome as evidence of the spirit of healthy college life.

The season of the club is confined to the Christmas holidays and the Easter recess.
