Newspaper publishers are making an effort to have the order postponed until subscribers have more opportunity to square up. Unless this is done The Review will be forced to comply with the mailing as will all other papers. The only way to be sure that you will get your Review after Jan. 1st is to pay the subscription at once. While you are at it you might as well pay in advance, and be sure to tell us for whom you wish to vote in the big contest.

Later—We understand that the above order will not take effect July, 1st, 1908.

Notice of Assessment for Sewer Improvements

To the owners of property abutting and adjoining on the below described streets and parts of streets in the City of Denison, Iowa, and to all whom it may concern:

You are hereby notified that there is now on file in the office of the City Clerk of Denison, Iowa, for your inspection, and for the inspection of any person, persons, company or corporation interested therein, a plat prepared by the City Engineer of said City, showing the separate lots or parcels of ground, on Walnut street commencing at the manhole at the intersection of Walnut street and Anthony street and running thence west on Walnut street two blocks to the intersection of Walnut street and Howard street, thence north on Howard street one block to the intersection of Howard street and Chestnut street, subject to assessment for sewer improvement, now made or being on that portion of streets above specified, in accordance with a certain contract entered into on the 18th day of October A. D., 1907, by and between the City of Denison, Iowa, and A. J. Gary of Denison, Iowa, for the improvement of said streets above specified by laying a sewer thereon as provided by contract; such plat shows the names as far as practicable of the several owners of abutting and adjoining property and the amount to be assessed against each lot or parcel of ground. And now any person, persons, company or corporation, having any objections to the same, or to prior proceedings, on account of errors, irregularities or inequalities, as to the tax proposed, to be assessed for said improvements, shall file with the City Clerk, his or their objections on or before the 8th day, of Jan. A. D. 1908, at 7:30 o'clock P.M. on said day at which time the City Council of the City of Denison, Iowa, will meet at the City Hall of said City for the purpose of hearing and considering said objections and hearing any party interested whom may desire to be heard in support of said objection, and to make the necessary correction, if any, in said proposed assessment and that after making all corrections in the assessment as proposed by said plat, will assess and levy special proportion of said cost of said improvement, according to law and according to the said assessment proposed to be made for the said improvement.
