

DEATH OF EDWARD KNOTT, SR.

Edward Knott, Sr., died at his home in Manilla Tuesday morning, Dec. 21, 1907 at the advanced age of 74 years 7 months and 13 days, after an illness since his return from his trip east last September.

Edward Knott was born May 11, 1833 in Leitrim county Ireland and was married to Allie Honeyman in 1855. To this union were born two girls and seven boys, all of whom are living except the second oldest daughter, Alice, who died some fifty years ago, in infancy.

In 1865 Mr. Knott came to America and settled at Providence, Bureau county, Illinois, after living there four years he moved to Malden, Ill., and resided there until the spring of 1887, when he came to Crawford county, Iowa, and settled on his farm four miles northeast of Manilla, where he

resided until some four years ago, when after accumulating a sufficiency of worldly goods he decided to retire from roaming and to build a comfortable home in Manilla. This he did and he resided here until his death.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Allie Knott, one daughter, Mrs. Margaret McGafferty, who lives north of town, and seven sons, Patrick and James, who both reside in Omaha, William deputy sheriff of Denison, Edward, Jr., Frank and Peter, who live in Manilla and George who resides on the old home place. Seventeen grand children and four great grand children also survive him.

Mr. Knott was a man quite extensively known, and one whom every body respected, a father, beloved by all his family, and a kind loving husband.

Funeral services were held at the Sacred Heart church Thursday morning at 10:30 o'clock, conducted by Rev. Father Coffy and interment was made in the Catholic cemetery, six of his sons acting as pall bearers.

The whole community unites with the bereaved relatives in their heartfelt hour of grief.

Obituary.

Died, Mrs. Pete Johnson, wife of Pete Johnson, Dec. 19, 1907, after a short illness of heart trouble.

Mrs. Johnson whose maiden name was Anna Herbstreuth, was born in Germany, Nov. 22, 1869, and was there fore 8 years of age at the time of her death. Funeral was held at the Presbyterian church Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock and interment made in the Nishnabotny cemetery.
