## PROMINENT GERMAN DIES

John H. Reimers of Otter Creek Dies on Wednesday Afternoon

We chronicle with regret the death of Mr. John H. Reimers which occurred at his farm near Schleswig on Wednesday Jan. 8th at two p. m. He had been sick but a short time and few friends knew of his being confined to the house. Death came from heart trouble. The funeral will be held at the home on Sunday at one p. m. Mr. Reimers was born at Hamme Schleswig Holstein in 1848, and was sixty years old. He leaves a wife and five sons and a daughter, besides two brothers, who reside in this country. Mr. Reimers was one of the farmers to go out "over the Ridge Road" up in the settlement and by hard work and good management became the owner of many acres of land, having, added a new farm in the past year. There is genuine sorrow among his German friends over the death of this excellent man. He at one time took prominent part in politics and was county president of the Corn Belt Meat Producers Association at the time of his death.

## EX-SHERIFF JOHN DETHMAN

Report that He Killed a Man in South Dakota

A dispatch to the daily press from Bonesteel, S. D., states that John Dethman, who was at one time sheriff of this county has shot and killed one George Taylor Ex-Sheriff of that county. The report says that Taylor had Dethman down in a struggle and that John shot him through the neck and that he died soon. It is reported that there was an old standing quarrel between them. Mr. Dethman is well known here. His mother and brother live not far from Charter Oak. We hope that facts will prove John was not to blame.

## MOTION FOR NEW TRIAL FILED

Attorneys for Hassen Bros file Motion for New Trial Alleging Many Errors

Conner & Lally, the attorneys for the Hassen brothers who were convicted of murder in the second degree filed on Jan. 8 the motion for a new trial, setting forth one hundred and thirteen errors made by the judge during the progress of the trial resulting in the conviction. Of course many errors were purely technical, but others will be urged with argument. County Attorney Klinker and his assistant Mr. Simms of the Shaw, Simms & Kuehnle firm, will go over the errors alleged and be ready to appear for the State when Judge Powers is here the last week of January to hold court.

## MAKE BIG HAUL

Forty-five Pairs of Shoes and Other Goods Found in Denison Home

Through the work of Officer Conrath of the Northwestern, informations were filed which led to the arrest today of John Weber, charged with receiving stolen goods, and Maurice Eland, Arthur Allaman and Carl Allaman, charged with stealing the goods from a freight car at Vail last February. All the facts in the case have not come out as yet but we are informed that all parties have confessed to the crimes charged against them.

It is alleged that last February, Eland and the Allaman boys broke into a car at Vail, taking a case of ladies shoes, some books and three Stenson hats. They are said to have hid the goods on the Eland farm south of Vail. Recently Mrs. Weber is said to have given a pair of new shoes to Mrs. Ralph Jackson. This and other things lead suspicion to the Weber home. A search of the attic revealed 45 pairs of new shoes, three Stenson hats and some of the missing books.

The four parties have been placed under arrest and their hearing will be on Monday.

## TO EXTEND LIBRARY

Denison Board Would Make This a County Library

## ANOTHER BOON FOR FARMERS

Denison Library of 4000 Volumes is Within Their Reach

Under the new law library privileges may be extended to different townships of the county upon the payment of a small tax to a city library. In this wise the residents of Milford township for, instance might secure all the benefits of the 4000 volumes now in the Denison city library. No single township could afford such a large library as Denison now has, no single township could afford to maintain such a library system but by clubbing together they may secure all the advantages that the town dwellers enjoy.

In fact it seems almost unfair to the town that it should pay one thousand dollars a year for a library that the farmers of an entire township can enjoy for a very much smaller sum. On the other hand it costs the town but little more and the additional money can be used for the purchase of new books so that in time our library may contain many more than 4000 volumes. At a meeting of the library board held last week it was decided that other townships be allowed the use of the library privileges providing they arrange to assist in its support as permitted by the new law.


