The attention of the editor has been called to the fact that the Sioux City Journal classes us as a stand-pat paper. The Review has been careful to avoid factionalism. It believes sincerely that the difference between the Iowa factions is not the difference between tweedle dee and tweedle-dum in some respects. At the same time the Review has for a long time trained with the so-called progressives. While the principles may be almost the same in the abstract, we believe the progressives are the men for reform, and represent the breaking away from the old corpora-tion control with which the politics of the nation has been cursed. The Review is not fired with such zeal for any man that it would read republicans out of the party, or be an offensive factionalist but in spite of its high personal regard for many of the stand-pat leaders it must respectfully decline to wear the collar placed upon it by the Journal, and declare itself in favor of Rooseveltism as represented by such men as Governor Cummins and Garst. In view of the honorable record of Senator Allison in the past, this paper has spoken most kindly of him on various occasions and has friendly feelings to him now. In view however of his advancing age and the state of his health which makes him an invalid, and that he may not live to full usefulness to the end of his present term, the Review will support Governor Cummins for senator at the coming primaries.

The republican state central committee at its recent meeting issued a call for a convention at Des Moines March 18th, to elect four delegates at large to the national convention to meet at Chicago June 16th. At the same time and place the eleven districts of the state will choose twenty-two delegates to complete the representation of Iowa in the selection of a national ticket. The second state convention provided by law for the nomination of supreme judges and candidates for state office in cases where no candidate at the primary has received thirty-five per cent, of the party vote cast, will be held at Waterloo in June. Attorney General Byers has been named as temporary chairman of the March conven-tion.

The spasm of virtue with which the Bulletin contemplates the Review list is amusing. REVIEW'S MARKET LETTER

Furnished by Clay Robinson Co, the Well Known Omaha Firm.

South Omaha, Jan. 18th 1908. There has been a heavy run of cattle here all this week. The trade the early part of the week was steady to strong, top cattle selling at \$5.70. After the middle of the week, however, packers became quite bearish in view of the liberal offerings, and prices declined 15 to 20c. This took effect on practically all classes of killing grades. Good to choice dry lot heaves are quotable at \$5.25 and \$5.60; fair to good \$4.75 to \$5.25; good to choice cows and heifers \$3.75 to \$4.25; fair to good \$3.25 to \$3.75. There has been a good strong demand for all kinds of stockers and feeders, particularly the heavier grades. Good to choice heavy feeders are selling at \$4.00 and \$4.75; fair to good \$3.75 to \$4.25; good to choice light and medium weight \$3.75 to \$4.25; fair to good \$3.40 to \$3.75. The hog market today was a nickel lower than yesterday. The bulk sold at \$4.20 to \$4.25; top, \$4.32, very close to Chicago figures.

Nothing but the heavy supplies, apparently, holds prices down. All classes of buyers prefer the strong weight and pay a premium for them, while underweight stuff is selling at a discount everywhere. For good hogs of all weight, however, the range of prices is rather narrow.

Excessive receipts are hardly possible at this time of the year and prospects are favorable for improvement in both demand and prices next week.

WILL PASS THROUGH HERE.

'Around the World' Auto Race Will Go Right Past Our Doors

Automobilists every where are greatly interested in the "New York to Paris" automobile race covering a distance of 20,000 miles, which will occur next summer. What will be of special interest to Crawford county people is that this race will sweep through Crawford county from east to west, passing through the streets of Vail, Denison, Arion, and Dow City. The race starts at New York, moving westward to Nome, Alaska, across Behrin Strait, and then through Siberia and all of Asia and Europe to Paris. The Register and Leader said of the matter.

"The official route of the automobile race from New York to Paris, a distance of 20,000 miles, has been determined upon. The cars will go across the long journey, and will cover a distance of 5,200 miles on this, its first stage. Its course passes through twelve states in all, and fully 500 cities. In all of these states the cars will not be hampered by registry requirements with the single possible exception of Pennsylvania. The speed laws will be carefully observed in each state, the sections of the code governing this matter having been prepared for the use of the drivers.

Iowa will be one of the states which will be traversed. The Mississippi river will be crossed at Camanche, Iowa, and the cars will then proceed to Council Bluffs through the following towns:

Camanche, Low Moor, Malone, DeWitt, Grand Mound, Calamus, Wheatland, Lowden, Clarence, Stanwood, Mechanicsville, Lisbon, Mount Vernon, Bertram, Cedar Rapids, Fairfax, Norway, Watkins, Blairtown, Luzerne, Belle Plaine, Chelsea, Tama, Montour, Le Grand, Quarry, Marshalltown, Lamaille, State Center, Colo, Nevada, Ames, Ontario, Jordan, Boone, Ogden, Grand Junction, Jefferson, Seranton, Glidden, Carroll, Maple River Junction, Arcadia, Vail, Denison, Dow City, Dunlap, Woodbine, Logan, Missouri Valley, Loveland, Honey Creek, Crescent and Council Bluffs; Here the Missouri river must be crossed to Omaha, Nebr., which is 1,536 miles from the starting point.


