Council met in adjourned session at 8 o'clock p. m.

Mayor Carey presiding. Members all present.

Minutes of previous and intervening meetings read and approved.

It was moved by Lane and seconded by Eggers that the following resolution be passed:

Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Denison, Iowa, that whereas the sewer commencing at the manhole at the intersection of Walnut and Anthony streets, and running thence west two blocks to the intersection of Walnut and Howard streets, thence north on Howard street to the intersection of Howard and Chestnut street, having been completed and the certificate of the City Engineer having been filed certifying to the completion of said sewer according to contract.

Be it resolved by the City Council of said City that aforesaid sewer be declared accepted by said City and the plat and schedule of assessment as prepared by the Engineer be placed in the office of the City Clerk for inspection, and notice of filing of said plat and schedule be ordered published in two weekly papers for two consecutive weeks in the City of Denison, Iowa, according to the laws and rules of the state of Iowa made and provided.

On roll call vote resulted as follows: Jones, yes; Wright, yes; Rollins, yes; Lane, yes; Tucker, yes; Eggers, yes.

Motion carried.

On motion council adjourned.
