HASSANS SENTENCED.

Each Must Serve Twenty-Five Years in Anamosa.

JOE SAYS HE IS INNOCENT.

Aged Father Overcome When New Trial is Not Granted.—Other Court News.

On Wednesday morning Judge F. M. Powers pronounced sentence upon the Hassans, Joseph and Solomon. Preceding this the motion for a new trial had been submitted and overruled and it was known that sentence was to be pronounced this morning. The room was fairly well filled with spectators when the defendants were brought into open court by the sheriff. Both looked pale and careworn. When asked if they had anything to say why sentence should not be pronounced, Joseph, in agitated tones protested his innocence. Solomon kept to that silence which characterized him throughout the trial.

Judge Powers attempted no grandstand play but simply and quietly pronounced the fateful words which will consign the Hassans to the penitentiary for a term of twenty-five years each. If they are model prisoners they can reduce their sentence to less than fifteen years actual time served and this is light sentence if they are guilty as found by the jury. If they are innocent, of course, any sentence is too heavy. The case will be appealed to the supreme court and a rehearing will be asked. Sheriff Meehan expects to leave for Anamosa with his prisoners this evening. He will be glad to no longer have the responsibility of their care, for while they were exemplary prisoners the charge against them was so serious that the sheriff felt it necessary to use every precaution to prevent any possible escape.

The McHenry's the famous criminal lawyers of Des Moines were engaged by friends of the Hassans to assist at the last, but Judge Powers refused a continuance of the motion and overruled the motion for a new trial so there was no opportunity for Denison people to hear the noted advocate. One could but pity the aged father of the Hassans. When he learned that the motion for a new trial had been overruled and that the boys would be sentenced, he was completely overcome and but for assistance he would have fallen to the floor. He has been faithful and loyal to his sons, in their great trial and the sympathy of the community is with him.
