Feb. 2, Jesus the Savior of the World.—John 3: 1-17.

The lesson verses for this date include some of the most important in the New Testament. For they tell of the visit of Nicodemus, and the declarations of Jesus as to the new birth, and His further enunciation of John 3: 16, that God had sent His only begotten Son to die for sinful men, and show them the way to life eternal. It will thus be seen that the limits of this column will not permit of a beginning of a talk on the tremendous and important truths told in the lesson by the Savior of men.

Nicodemus was a man high in rank among the Jews, learned in the law of Moses, and the customs which had grown up since the death of the great leader. It is probable that he was in the eyes of those keeping the ceremonial law, blameless, but he was far from right in the eyes of God. His attitude was more that of the one of similar station, of whom Jesus told, who on going up into the temple to pray thanked God that he was not as other men, when his true prayer should have been "God be merciful to me a sinner." Jesus told this man, and the world of the new birth, of the new heart, of the changed nature, the love like spirit, the life of sacrifice for others, as contrasted with selfishness, and selfishness.

The truth spoken by Jesus at this time makes plain that there must be a change of heart and motive to be acceptable in His sight. The character, education, habits of thought of men and women, differ so that all are not similarly affected by the new birth, and therefore no one should set up standards and insist one must say, or do this and that, or act in a certain way or they are not right with God. Jesus said at another time it was not those who professed the most of being His followers, but those who did the will of God, who were accepted in His sight. But note that the bible does not teach that people can drift along in selfishness, occasionally doing a good act, or leading what is called a moral life, for the sake of appearances, and in the end obtain the everlasting life promised to believers in, and followers, of Jesus. There must be an indwelling of God's spirit. This may come to some by a radical change on a given date, and to other a growth into a life of righteousness. It is essential that it must be in the heart and nature somehow, sometime, somewhere.

The latter verses of the lesson are familiar because so important. They say that as Moses lifted the serpent in the wilderness, and as by a look of faith at the serpent the Jews of old were healed, so Jesus was lifted up and all who looked to Him with faith shall have eternal life. The verses say that God did not send Jesus to condemn, but to save the people. They say that Jesus was the only begotten Son of God, and that out of love to us. He was sent, so that we might have everlasting life, through belief in His name. John 3:16 is the Golden Text and should be implanted in the hearts of all.
