### A NOBLE LIFE ENDED.

Mrs. N. P. Underhill died of heart disease at her home in Arion, Thursday, Jan. 23, 1908. Her maiden name was Eliza A. Gleason. She was born in Lincoln county, Ohio, Jan. 13, 1843. She was married to N. P. Underhill Sept. 22, 1858 in Holmer county, Ohio. To this union four children were born, Ira A. of Sioux City, Lottie I. deceased, Ohio M. and Chas. W. of Omaha. In 1861 Mr. Underhill was called upon to leave the young wife and babies and fought bravely for his country. In 1865 shortly after his return from the battle field they moved to Illinois, where they resided until 1870 when they moved to Crawford county, Iowa, and purchased land in Willow township, where they by their industry, secured a large farm upon which they built a beautiful home and remained there until 1893, when they came to Arion, Iowa, and have since that time been honored citizens of this place.

The funeral services were conducted at the Congregational church Saturday afternoon, Rev. Douglas officiating. The remains were taken to Dunlap and buried in the cemetery at that place, where many sorrowing friends followed to her place of rest.

Just previous to her death she seemed to see a dark cloud hovering over her, but beyond this cloud she said "all was beautiful and bright" and as she bade the loved ones goodbye she asked them to meet her in the life beyond where there are no sorrows, pain nor partings.

Rev. Douglas preached a touching sermon. The choir consisting of L. C. Butler Mrs. Evans, Fern Butler

and N. F. Stillson furnished appropriate music. The floral offerings were beautiful. The church contained many potted plants. The casket was covered with flowers sent by numerous friends, near the casket the broken wheel was placed which was given by the Ladies Aid Societies and others, a beautiful anchor from the family, and wreath of roses from the Ladies club, all indicated the love and esteem in which she was held.

The pall bearers were: M. W. Maxey, J. L. Maurer, L. C. Butler, N. F. Stillson, E. P. Wigg and Dan Swanson.

The honorary bearers were: W. B. Evans, Thos. Rae, Dan'l Cruise, A. Rogers, W. W. Coon, and Jeff Phillips.

In this death the family not only suffer the loss of a noble and loving mother and wife but the community loses one of its best citizens. She was indeed a grand woman, unpretentious but faithful and true to every duty which presented itself. She was a consistent and faithful member of the Presbyterian church and her exemplary christian life was inspiration to all who knew her. She leaves the husband and children of a well spent life and one who was well prepared to meet her God in whom she had implicit faith and trust.
