## PASTOR INSTALLED.

The First Presbyterian Church of Denison Has Installed Pastor

PASTOR REV J JAMES DEPREE

Solemn Ceremony Takes Place on Tuesday Evening Feb. 4th.

The Presbyterian church of this city has installed a new pastor in Rev. J. Jas. De Pree. The Presbytery of Sioux City had delegated to Rev. Lacey of the Manilla church authority to preside over the gathering held here on Tuesday evening. In the ceremonies which took place Rev. La Reau of the Baptist church read the scripture lesson and Rev. Thureason offered the opening prayer. Rev. Lacey gave a most eloquent sermon urging that all christians gird up their minds and progress in spiritual and educational ways. He spoke of the wonders of the world about us, and the realms of information in reading. His sermon showed much thought.

One of the most beautiful and impressive incidents of the occasion was the delegating to the esteemed father of the new minister, the office of delivering the charge to the pastor. Rev. De Pree of Sioux Center is a veteran in the service of the Dutch Reform church. It was a trying, but still precious hour when he could address his beloved son, whom he had dedicated many times in prayer to the ministry. He spoke of the opportunities given the pastor. Peter in his great epistle had said that as we had received of God's spirit we should communicate to others. The address was tenderly given and made a deep impress on all who heard it.

The charge to the people was given by Rev. McFadden of the Sioux City church. He is a minister of great

ability and his words were well chosen and to the point. He urged that it was not the pastor but the church membership which made a successful church. The people must be helpful, prayerful, not critical, not expecting many pastoral calls and then eloquent sermons. Such sermons came from long and careful study. He said there must be enthusiasm in the

church. St. Paul sets the example and no church could grow without it. Expect conversions and they will come.

The music was specially fine. Mrs. McConaughy singing a solo very sweetly and the choir showing careful training for the occasion. Many were the congratulations and best wishes given Rev. De Pree and his dear wife who stood by his side.

The new pastor comes from the good old Dutch blood, which has a record for tenacity of purpose which has made his forefathers famous for all time to come. They stood for their religion and their country until the Netherlands were bathed in blood.

It was with the Dutch that the Pilgrims found a home before their voyage to Plymouth Rock and the founding of the colony in New England which shaped the destinies of the American republic. He is the son of Rev. James DePree and wife and was born Feb. 29, 1876, at Spring Lake, Mich. The father is now the pastor of the Dutch Reform church at Sioux Center, Iowa. The family moved to Sioux county in 1880. The son graduated from the Northwestern Classical Academy of Orange City in 1895. Four years later he graduated from Hope College at Holland, Mich. He decided to enter the ministry of the Presbyterian church and so went east to the famous Princeton and took the theological course, graduating in 1903. The same year he took the pastorate of the Presbyterian church at Alta, Iowa, and remained there four years, resigning to accept the call to the church at Denison. Rev. DePree is married and has a child two years old. He is a preacher of the evangelistic order. His sermons are delivered in a most forceful manner and carry conviction to his hearers. The congregation at Denison is fortunate in securing so strong and able a pastor. It is to be hoped that he will be appreciated and kept here for many years.

## \$25,000.00 DAMAGES.

A Damage Suit From Carroll County In District Court.

Attorney General Byers Present as His Attorney, Assisted by Mr. Lally.

The first civil case before Judge Powers has been on, coming from Carroll county on change of venue. A jury has been secured and two days spent on the evidence. Mr. Escher claims that in the spring of 1806 he was driving a load of oats over a county bridge in Carroll county when the structure fell in dropping the man, wagon, team and load in to the creek beneath. He claims he was so hurt in body and nerves that he should recover \$25,000 in damages. Carroll county is resisting the claim in that he was not materially hurt.
