Obituary.

Sunday morning news reached town that John Sutton, well known in this community, had succumbed to an at- tack of pneumonia, at his home, eight miles north. Being ill only a short time, his death was a shock to this community.

Mr. Sutton was born at Mechanics- ville, Cedar county, Iowa, May 15, 1857 and died Saturday, January 25, 1908 on a farm near Vail, being at the time of his death, 50 years, 8 months and 10 days old. He lived at his native town until he came to Crawford county. On February 14, 1878 he was married to Lizzie Miller of the same place. In February, 1879 they came to Crawford county, where they have made their home since. To this happy union were born four chil- dren: Blanche Mae, wife of L. W. Buffington, of this place; Wm. How- ard, Marion F., and Ross Gladys, who are now at home. Mr. Sutton was a man well liked by everyone, he came in contact with and Crawford county loses one of its best, prosperous farm- ers.

He leaves to mourn a widow, four children, two sisters, Mrs. Susan Wil- son and Mrs. Mary Young, both of Mechanicsville, Iowa.

The funeral was held in the Presby- terian church here Tuesday after- noon, services being conducted by the Rev. U. G. Lacey. His old neighbors, S. J. Campbell, Charles Lefferts, Wm. McLaren, Allen Barber, Robt. Thomp- son and Hiram Vroman acted as pall bearers; interment being made in the Nishnabotany cemetery.

Messrs. John and Frank Miller, Mrs. Sutton's brothers, of Mechanicsville and Anthony Young, of Omaha, a nephew of the deceased were those who attended the funeral from a dis- tance. The entire community joins with the family in their bereavement.
