There has been but a fair run of cattle here this week. The trade has been more or less weak throughout, but prices closed up about the same as a week ago on most kinds of killers. Good to choice steers are quotable at \$5.00 to \$5.50; fair to good \$4.50 to \$5.00; good to choice cows and heifers \$4.00 to \$4.75; fair to good \$3.50 to \$4.00; veals \$4.00 to \$5.50; fat bulls \$3.75 to \$4.25. to \$4.50; good to choice medium weights \$4.35 to \$4.60; fair to good \$4.00 to \$4.35; good to choice light weights \$4.00 to \$4.35; fair to good \$3.85 to \$4.15.

The high market today is about a nickel higher. The bulk sold a \$4.20 to \$4.35; top \$4.40.
