

MEET IN CONVENTION

Crawford Republicans Meet in Delegate Convention.

ADDRESS BY HON. J. P. CONNER

Delegates to Des Moines Elected and County Central Committee Chosen.

Denison, Iowa, March 6, 1908. Pursuant to call the Republicans of Crawford county met in convention the Court House in Denison on Friday, March 6, 1908, 11 at o'clock a. m.

In the absence of Chairman W. M. McLennan the convention was called to order by E. F. Tucker, secretary of the county committee.

After announcing the purpose of the convention Mr. Geo. E. Spottswood, of West Side, was called to the chair as temporary chairman.

On motion E. F. Tucker was elected as temporary secretary.
